GUIX "Hello World" for EK-RA6M3G

Introduction

This application note describes the process of creating a simple two-screen GUI using Azure RTOS GUIX Studio for the EK-RA6M3G kit. This application demonstrates how easily a user can create and configure a new application using the Renesas Flexible Software Package (FSP).

The Renesas Flexible Software Package includes Azure RTOS ThreadX® real-time operating system, the Azure RTOS GUIX library and hardware drivers unified under a single robust software package. This powerful suite of tools provides a comprehensive integrated framework for rapid development of complex embedded applications.

The Hello World application was developed under e² studio using the Renesas Flexible Software Package.

Required Resources

Development tools and software

- e² studio IDE 2021-04 or greater
- Renesas Flexible Software Package (FSP) v3.1.0 or greater
- Azure RTOS GUIX Studio V6.1.7.0 or greater

Hardware

- Renesas EK-RA6M3G kit (RA6M3 MCU Group)

Purpose

This document will guide you through the setup of an Azure RTOS GUIX touch screen interface Hello World application in e² studio. This document will show how to configure the drivers and library included with the FSP. These will allow you to set up the GLCD Controller, the touch screen driver, and semaphores to communicate with application tasks. It also shows the steps necessary to create a simple GUI interface using the Azure RTOS GUIX Studio editor. In addition, this app note will also cover project setup along with basic debugging operations. When it is running, the application will respond to touchscreen actions, presenting a basic graphical user interface (GUI).

Intended Audience

The intended audience is users who want to design GUI applications.

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1. Download and Installing Tools

1.1 Overview

In this section you will copy materials to your PC and install v2021-04/FSP v3.1.0 and Azure RTOS GUIX studio v6.1.7.0.

1.2 Procedural Steps

1. If you already have e2 studio v2021-04 with FSP v3.1.0 or later installed, you can skip this step. Otherwise, you can download it from <https://www.renesas.com/us/en/software-tool/flexible-software-package-fsp>. Detailed installation instructions for the e2 studio and the FSP are available on the Renesas website <https://www.renesas.com/fsp>. Review the release notes for e² studio to ensure that the e2 studio version supports the selected FSP version. The starting version of the installer includes all features of the RA MCUs.
2. You can get Azure RTOS GUIX Studio V6.1.7.0 or greater from this [link](#). If it goes well, you will see the window in the next step on the web browser.
Note: Microsoft Store must be working on your PC to install Azure RTOS GUIX studio.
3. Click **Get** to start installing Azure RTOS GUIX studio.

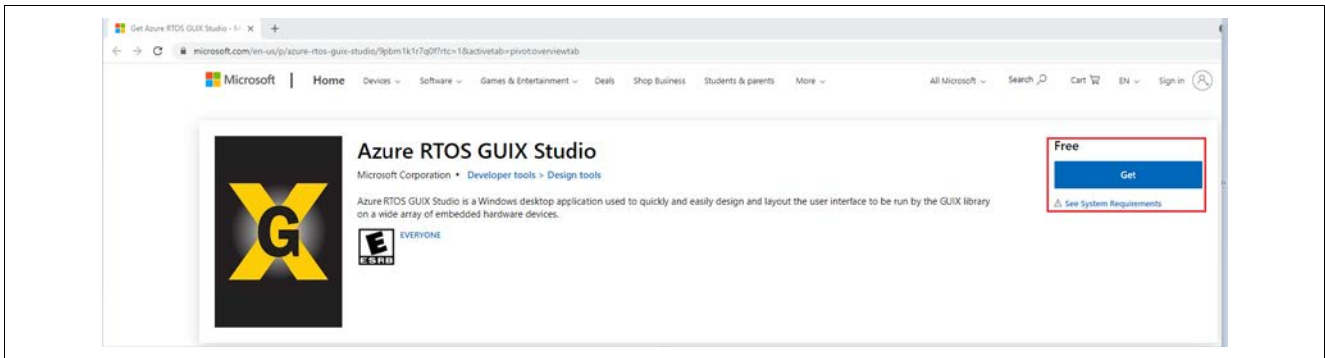


Figure 1. Get Azure RTOS GUIX Studio

4. Click **Open Microsoft store** to continue installing Azure RTOS GUIX studio.

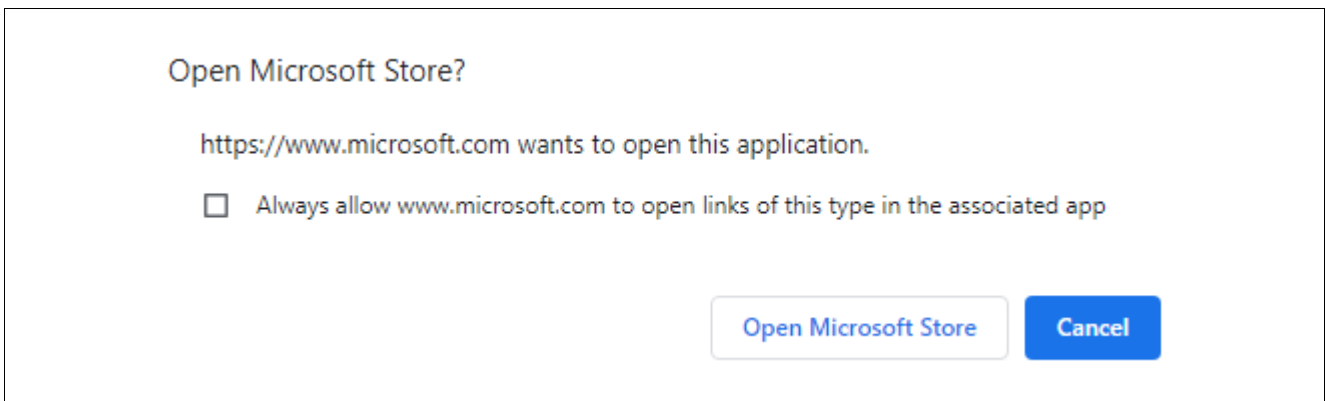


Figure 2. Open Microsoft Store

5. Click **Install** to continue. A window shows up to ask for a Microsoft account, which is seen in the next step.

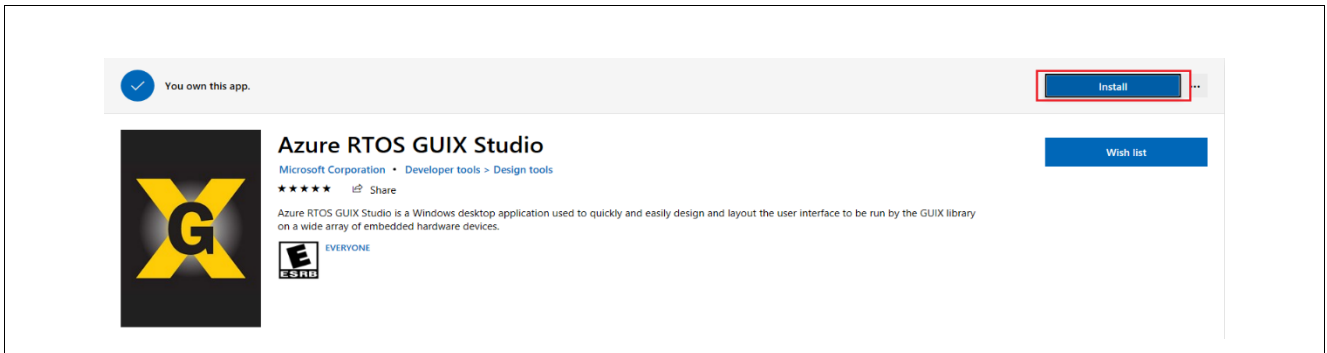


Figure 3. Install

6. Ignore it by clicking **X** on the top-right to close this pop-up window and continue Azure RTOS GUIX studio installation.

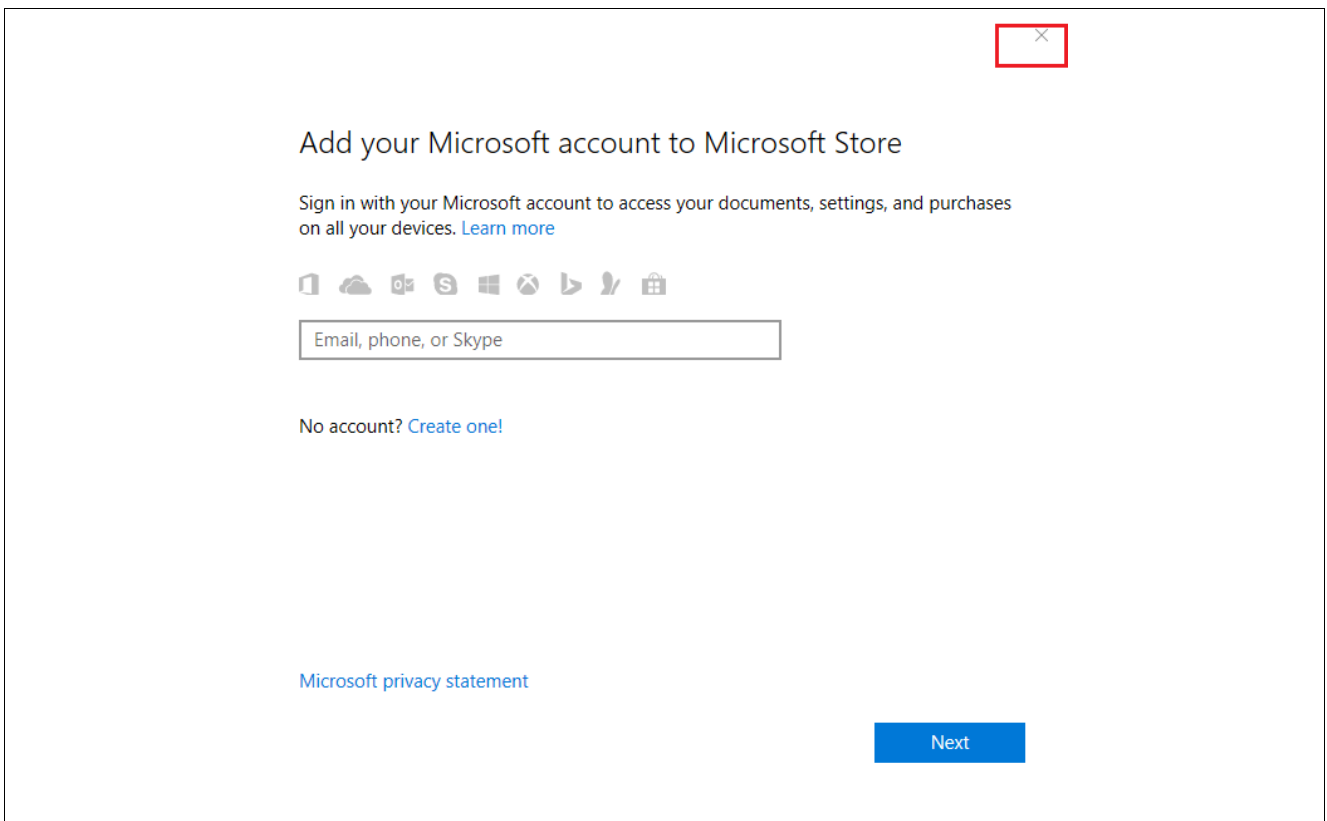


Figure 4. Close Pop-Up

7. It starts downloading and installing Azure RTOS GUIX studio.

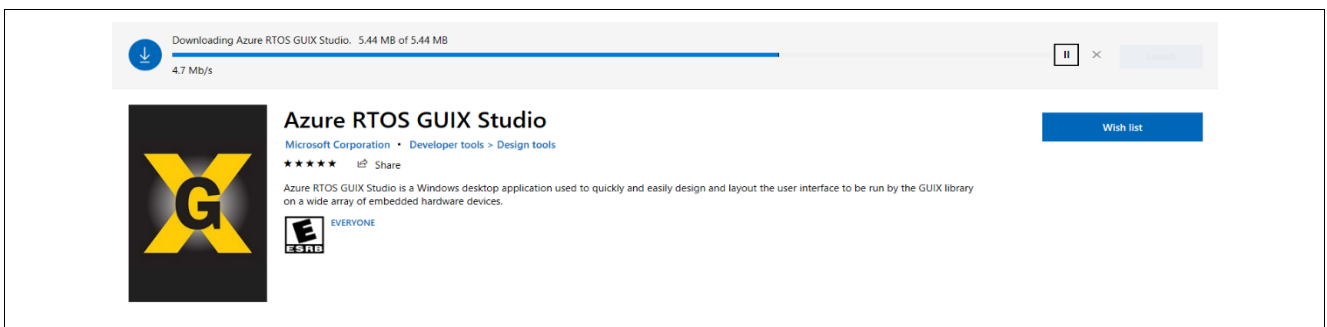


Figure 5. Downloading Azure RTOS GUIX Studio

8. Click **Launch** to launch Azure RTOS GUIX studio.

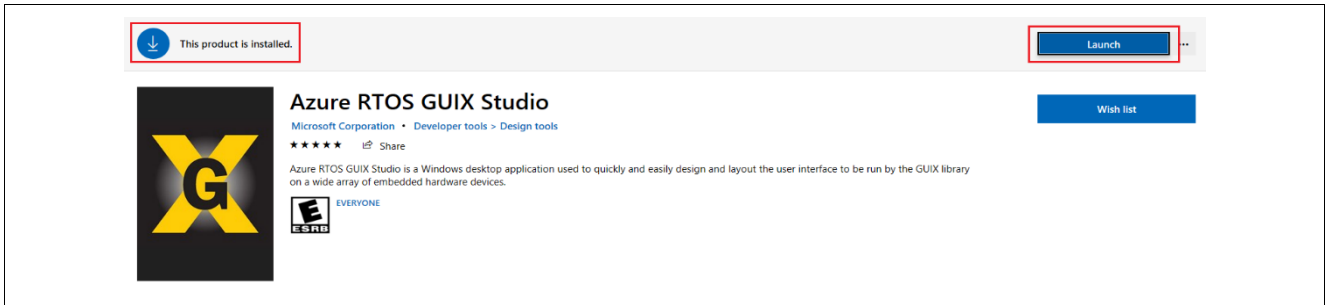


Figure 6. Launching Azure RTOS GUIX Studio

9. Azure RTOS GUIX studio 6.1.7.0 launched.

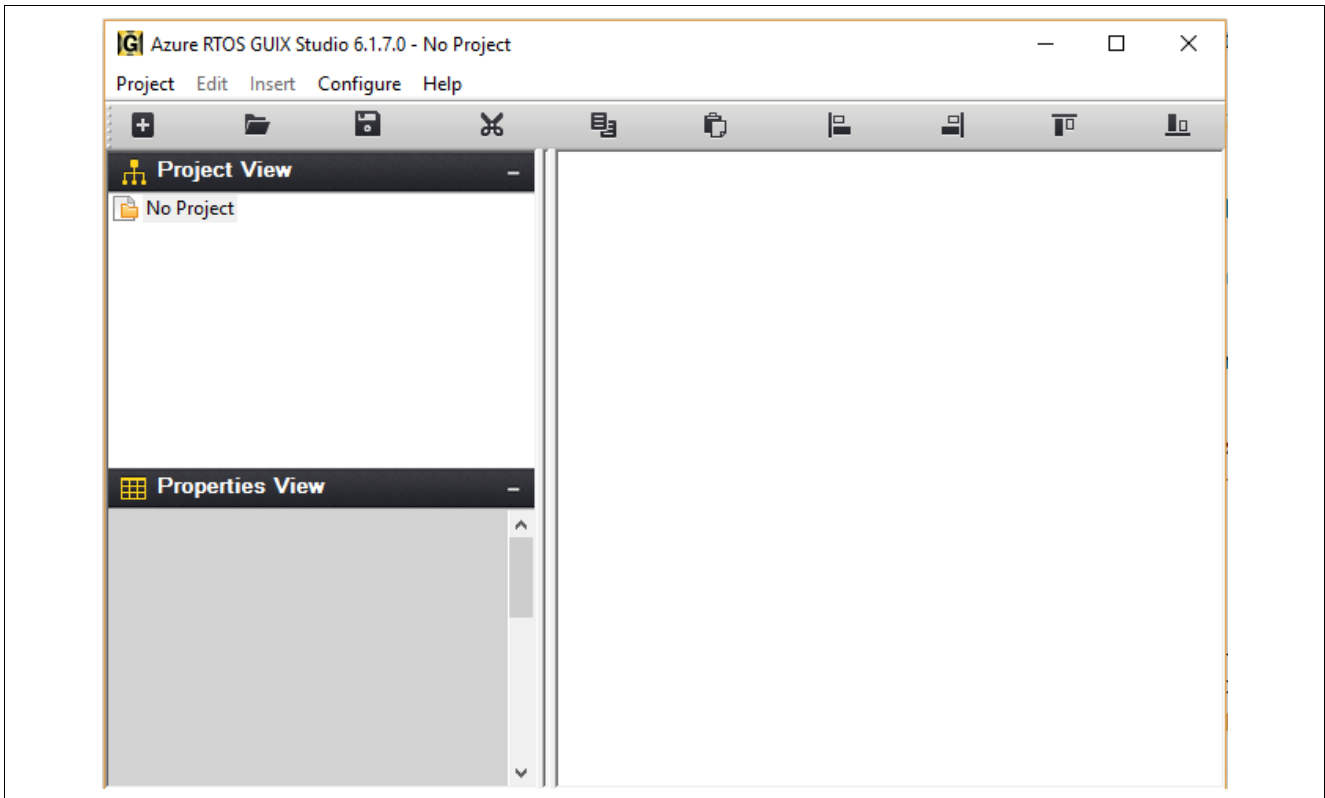


Figure 7. Azure RTOS GUIX Studio

10. Close Azure RTOS GUIX studio, for now, you will open it again later.

2. Create Application Note Project and Enabled Backlight

2.1 Overview

In this section, you will create a project to which you will add pre-written source code and integrate it with a pre-created Azure RTOS GUIX studio project.

2.2 Procedural Steps

1. Create a new **Renesas RA C/C++ project**. Name it **Hello_World_GUIX_EK_RA6M3G**.

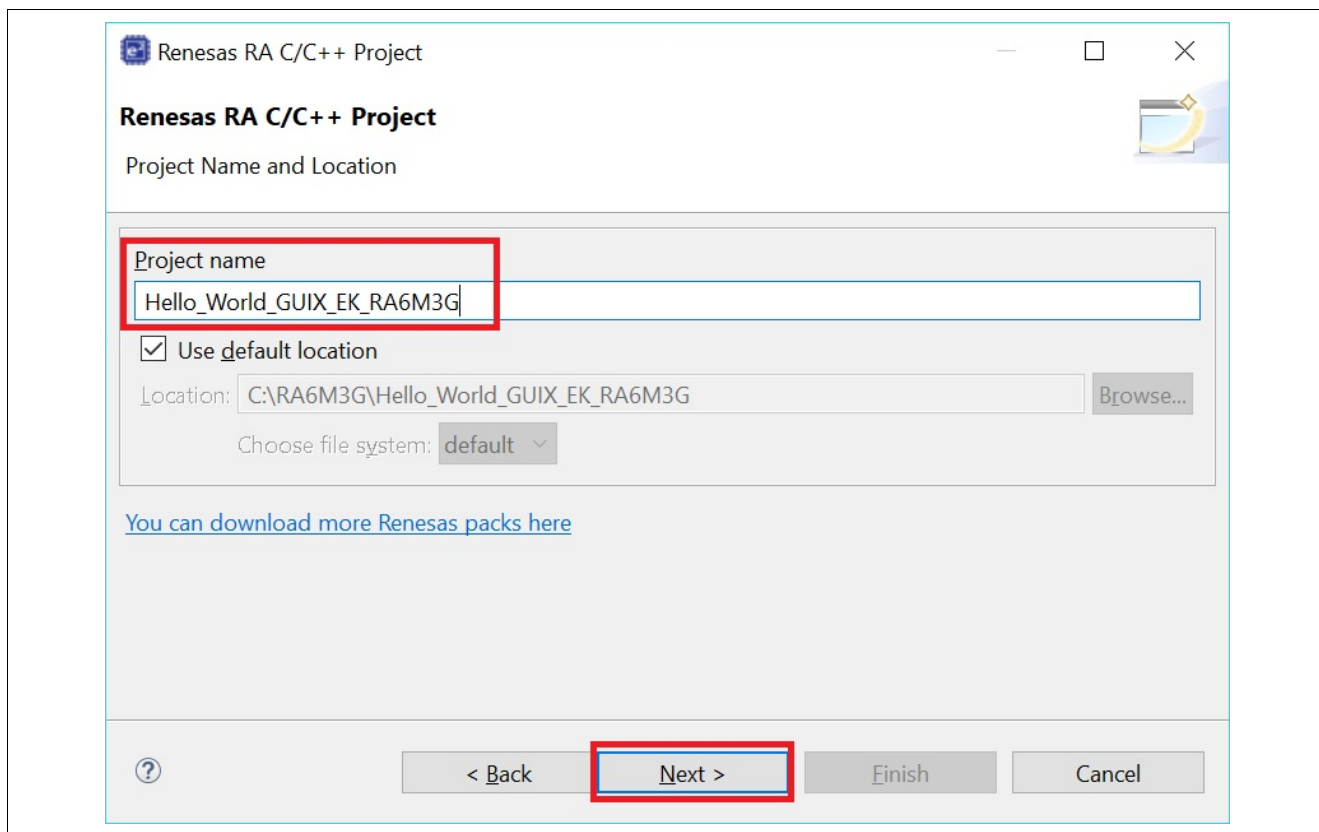


Figure 8. Create New Project

2. Set board to EK-RA6M3.

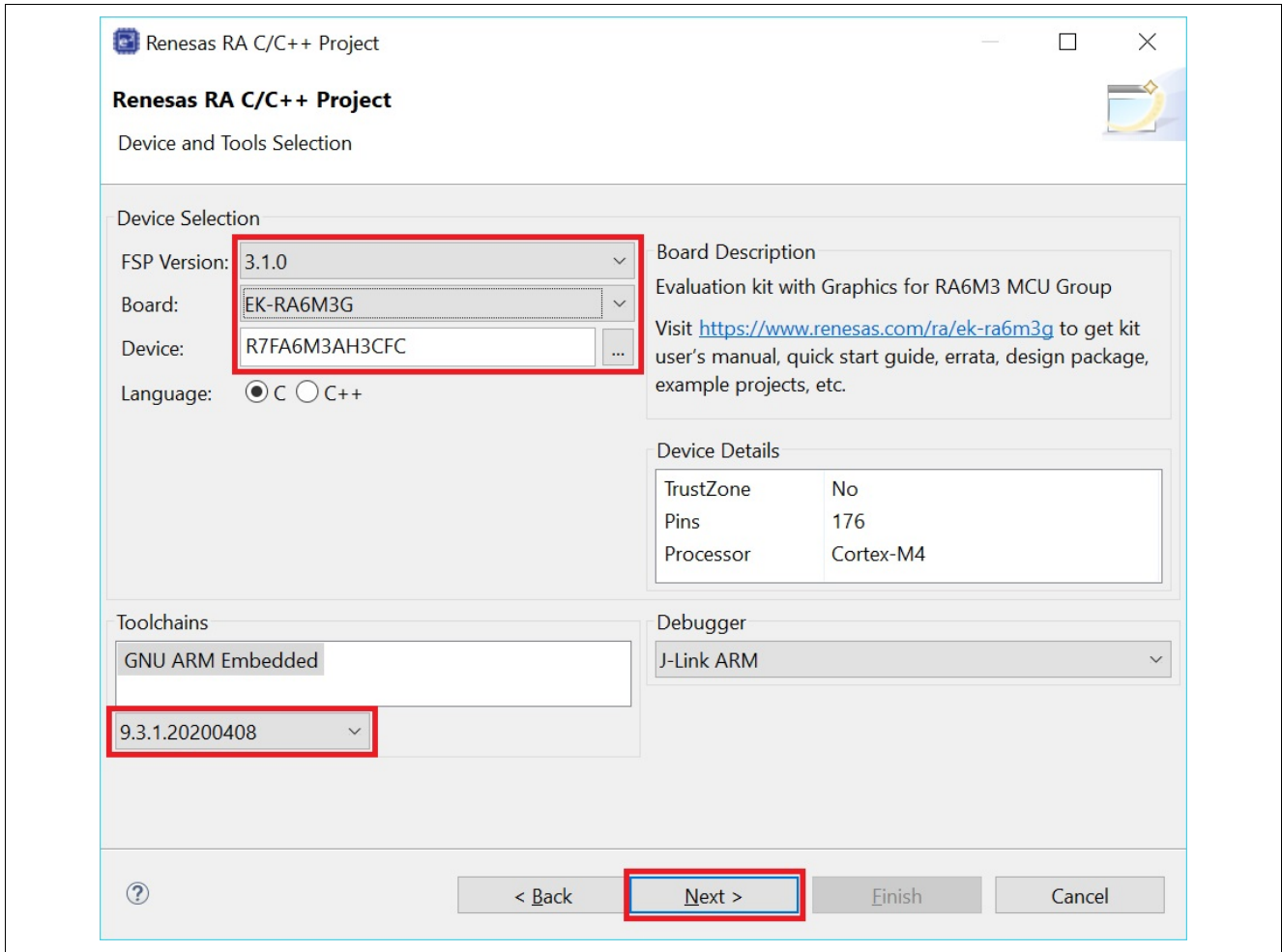


Figure 9. Set Board to EK-RA6M3G

3. Select **Azure RTOS ThreadX (v6.1.8+FSP.3.1.0)**.

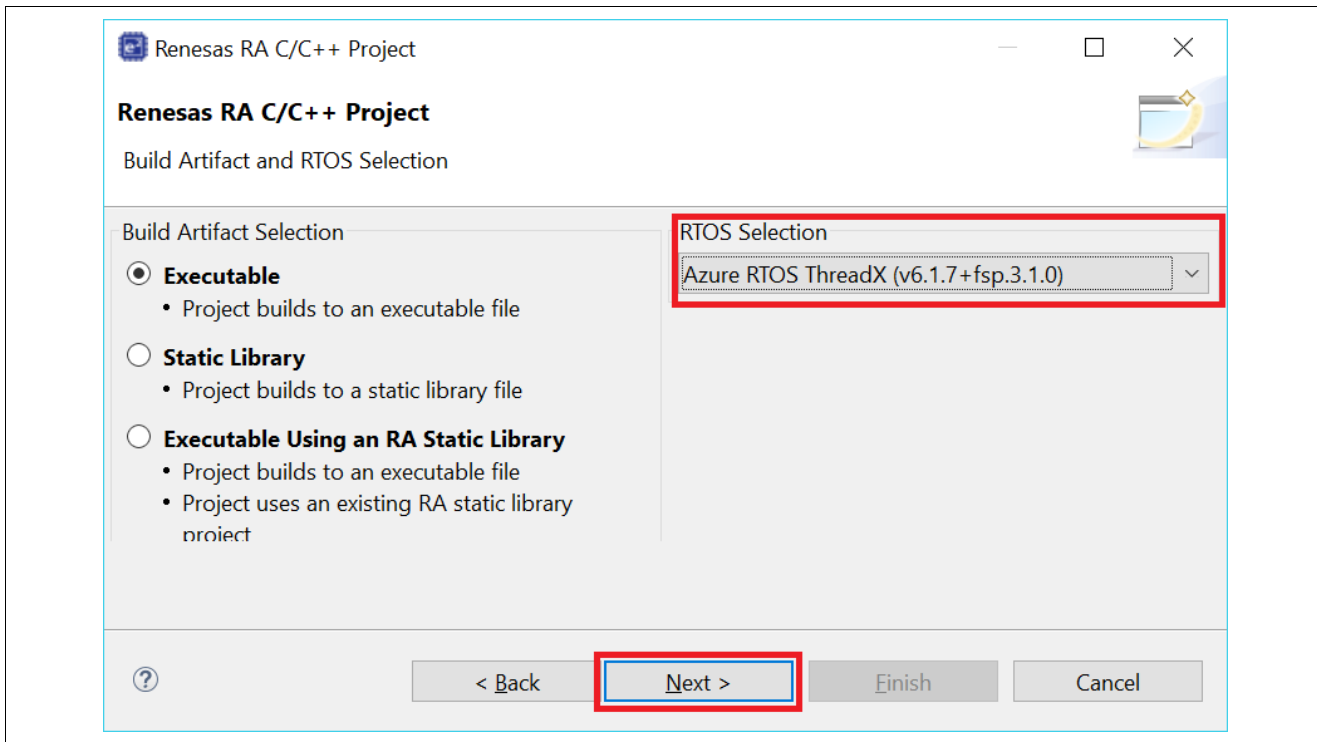


Figure 10. Select Azure RTOS ThreadX

4. Use Azure RTOS ThreadX-Minimal template.

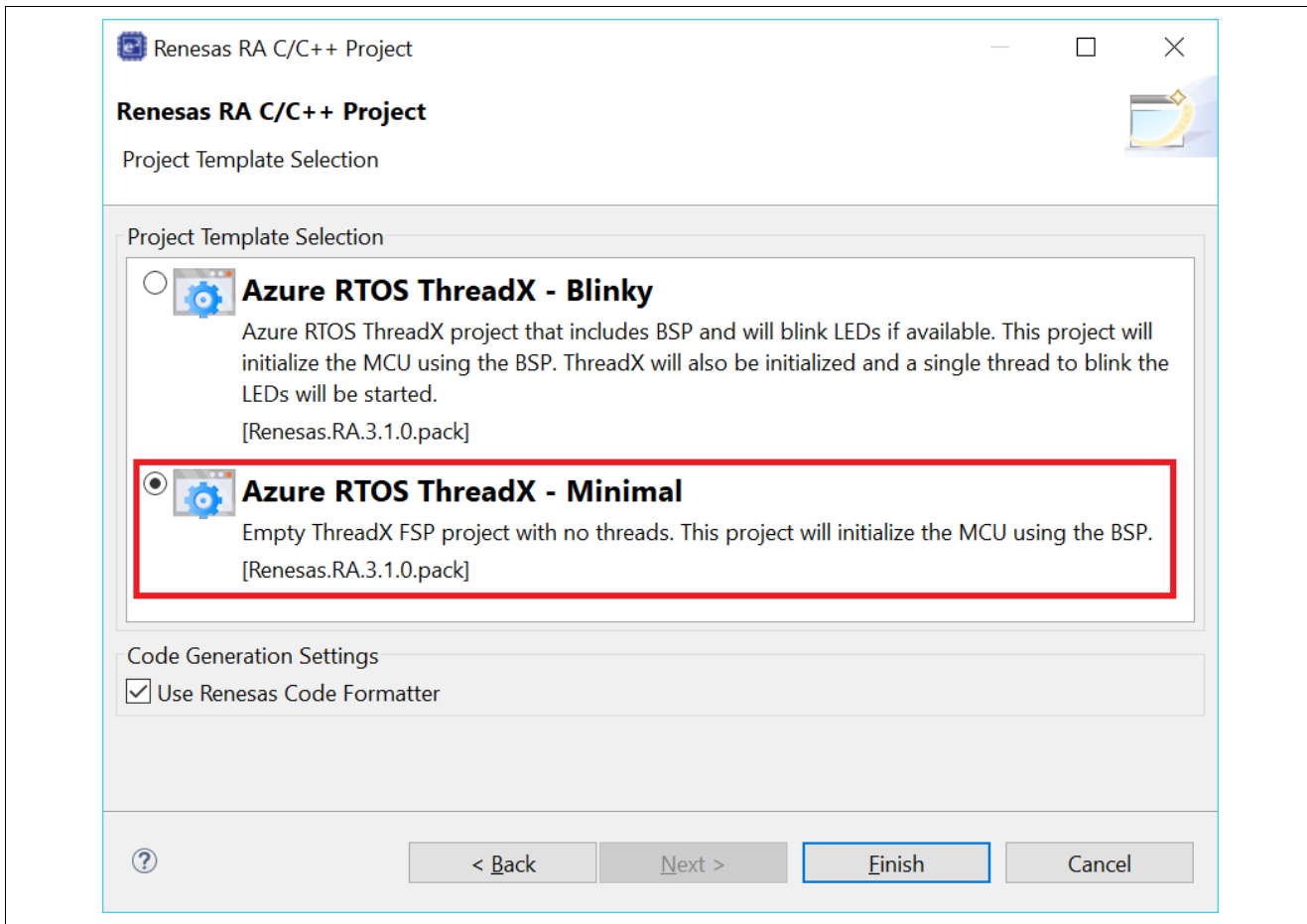


Figure 11. Select Minimal template

5. Open the project configuration and go to the **BSP** tab. Change **Heap size (bytes)** to **0x2000**.

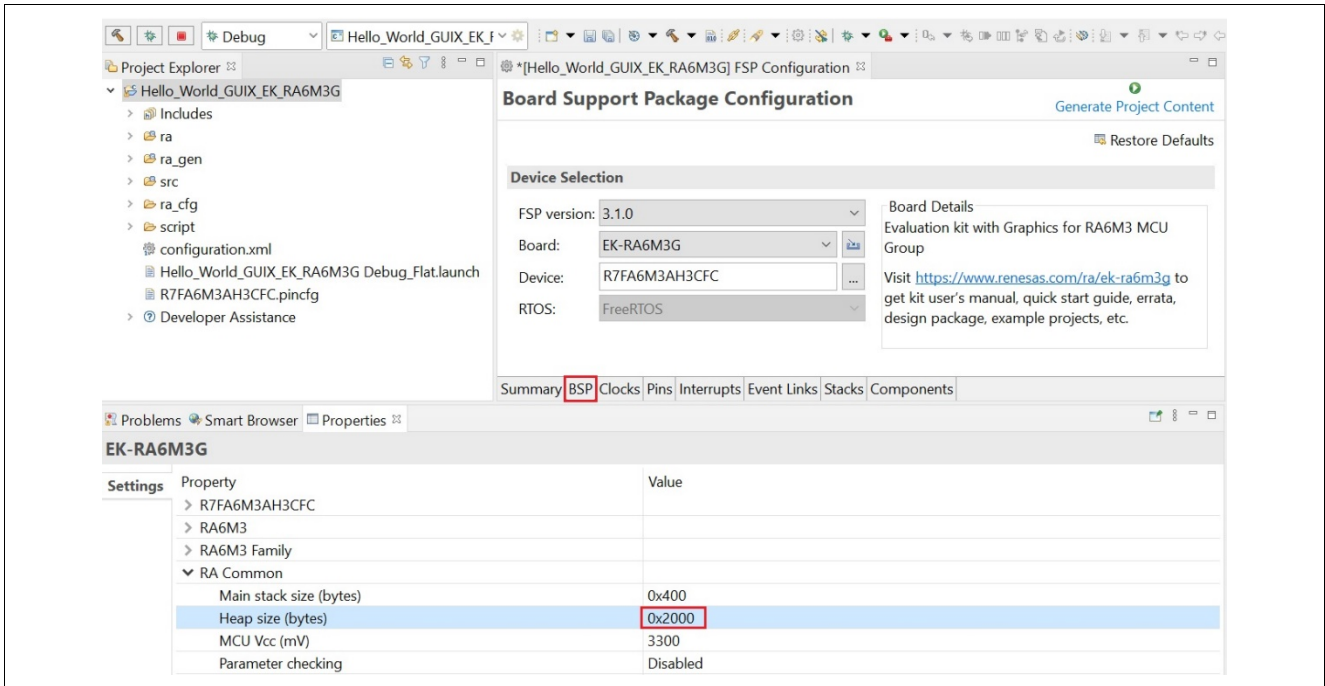


Figure 12. Change Heap Size

6. You can remove **Azure RTOS ThreadX Port** if you want.

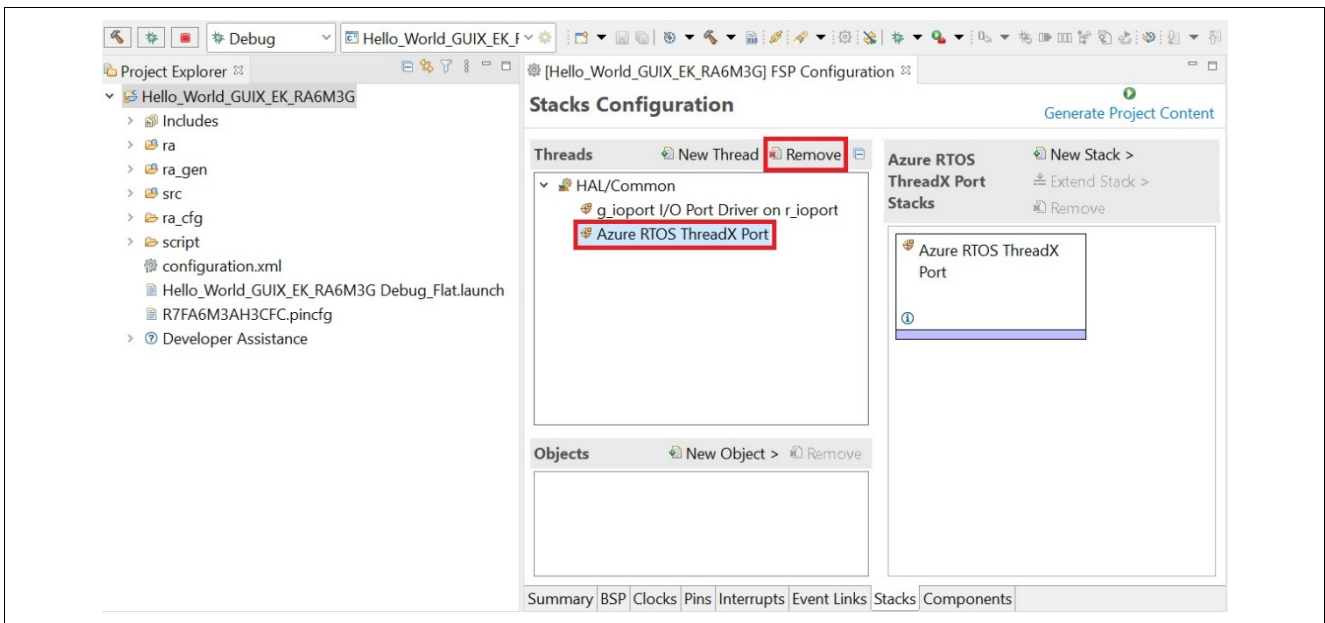


Figure 13. Remove Azure RTOS ThreadX Port

7. Add a **new thread** and name it as **System Thread** with below settings.

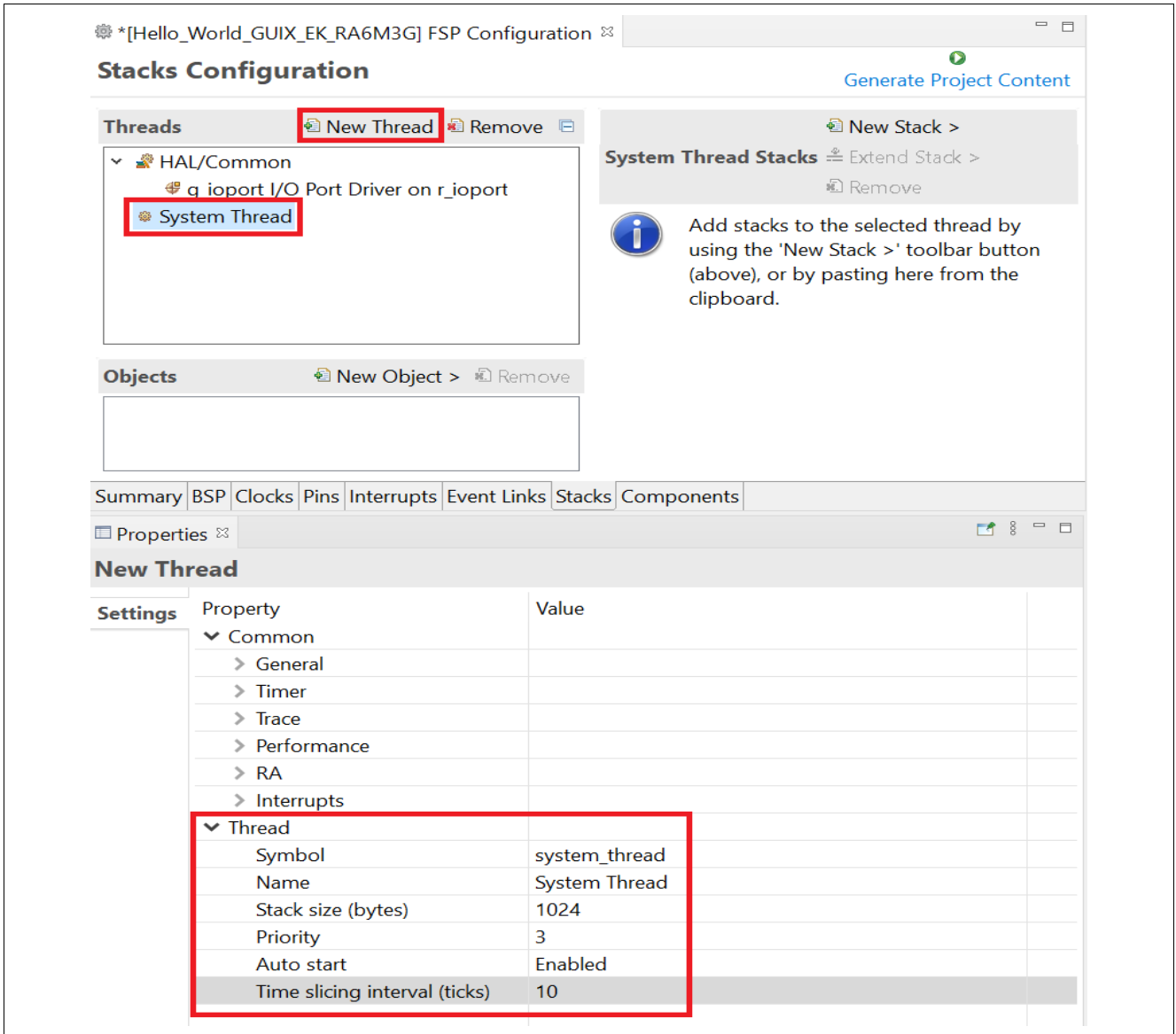


Figure 14. Add System Thread

8. Add Azure RTOS GUIX to system thread.

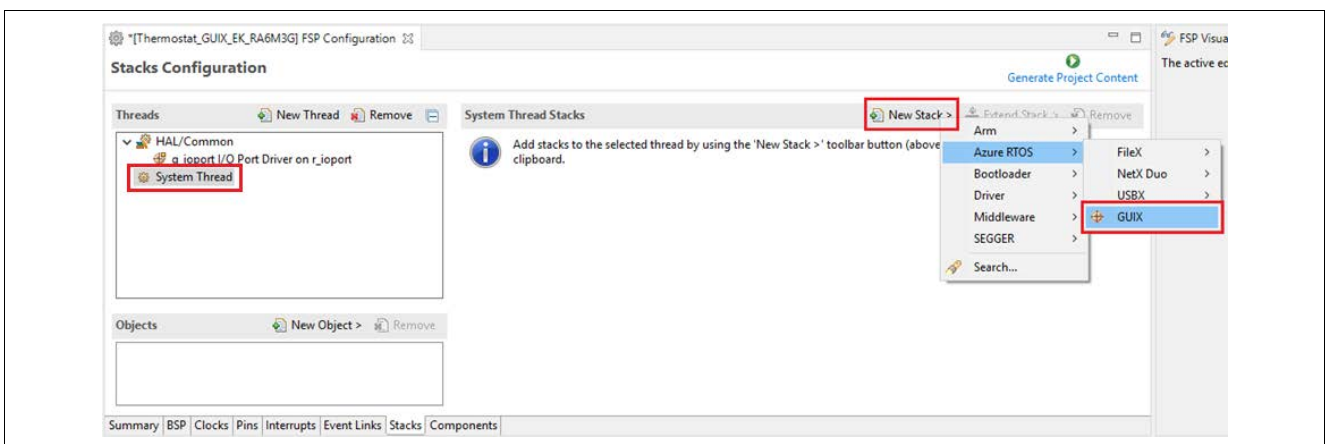


Figure 15. Add Azure RTOS GUIX

9. Add **GUIX** framework for GLCDC configuration.

15. In the **Pin Configuration**, first set **Mode** to **Disabled** for the pin P603 to disable LCD panel back light.

16. In the **Stacks** tab, select **System Thread** and add in a **New Stack > Driver > Timers > Timer Driver on r_gpt**.

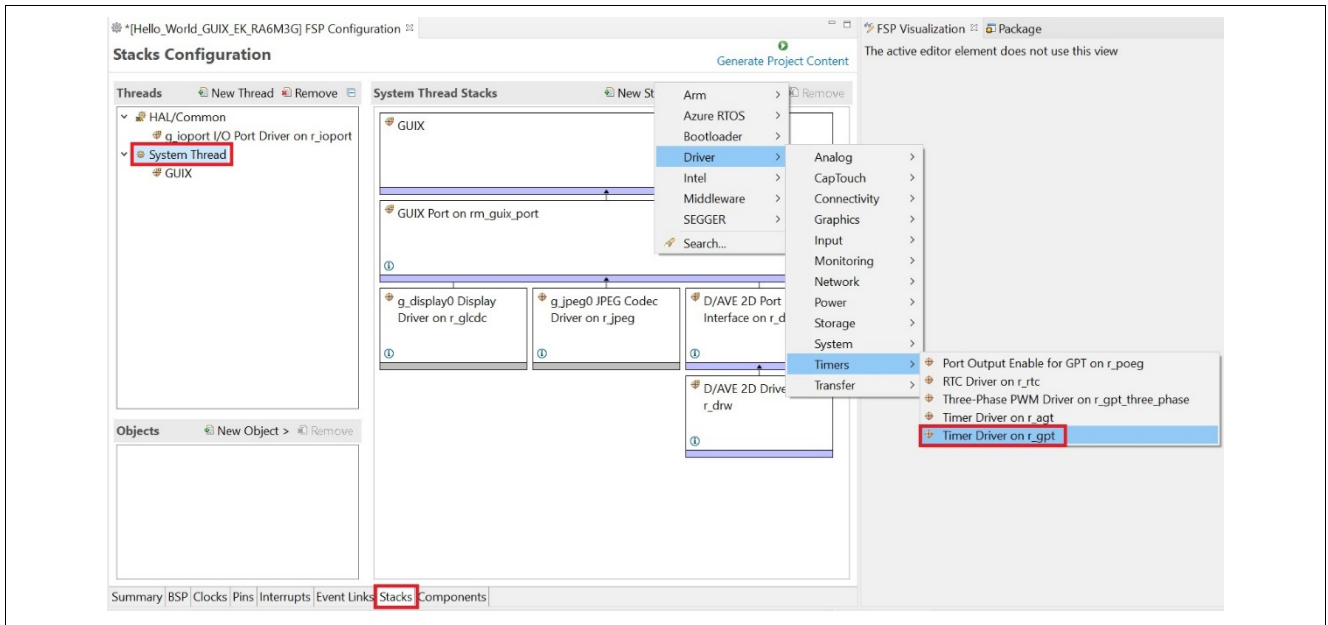


Figure 23. Add Timer Driver on r_gpt

17. Now, set and configure the properties of **Timer Driver on r_gpt**. Select **GTIOCA Output Enable**. Select **GTIOCA** and hit the arrow => for selecting and setting properties of the pin P603 (follow the images below).

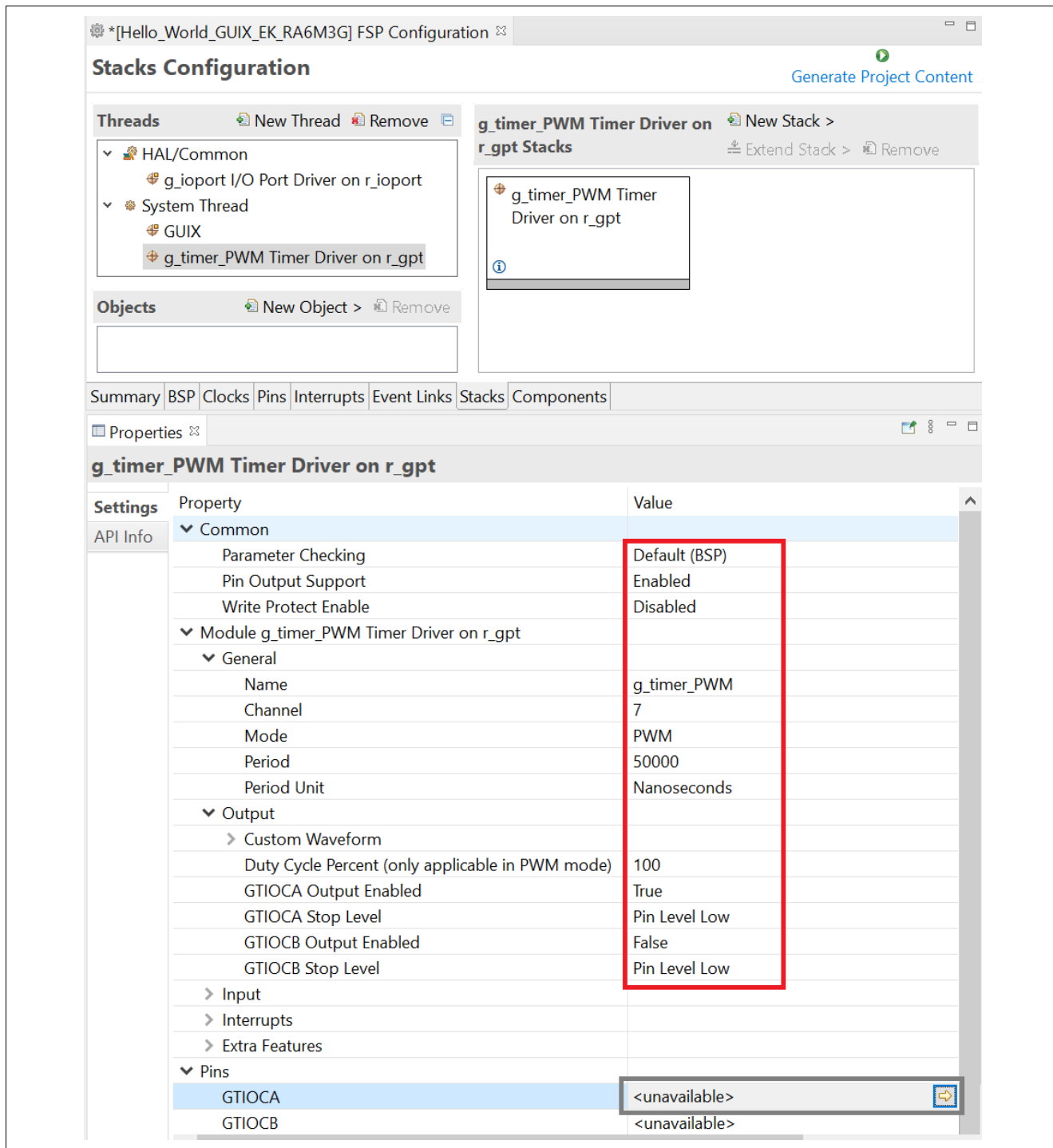


Figure 24. Properties of Timer Driver on r_gpt

18. Set and configure the pin P603 for the LCD_BLEN signal of the LCD panel.

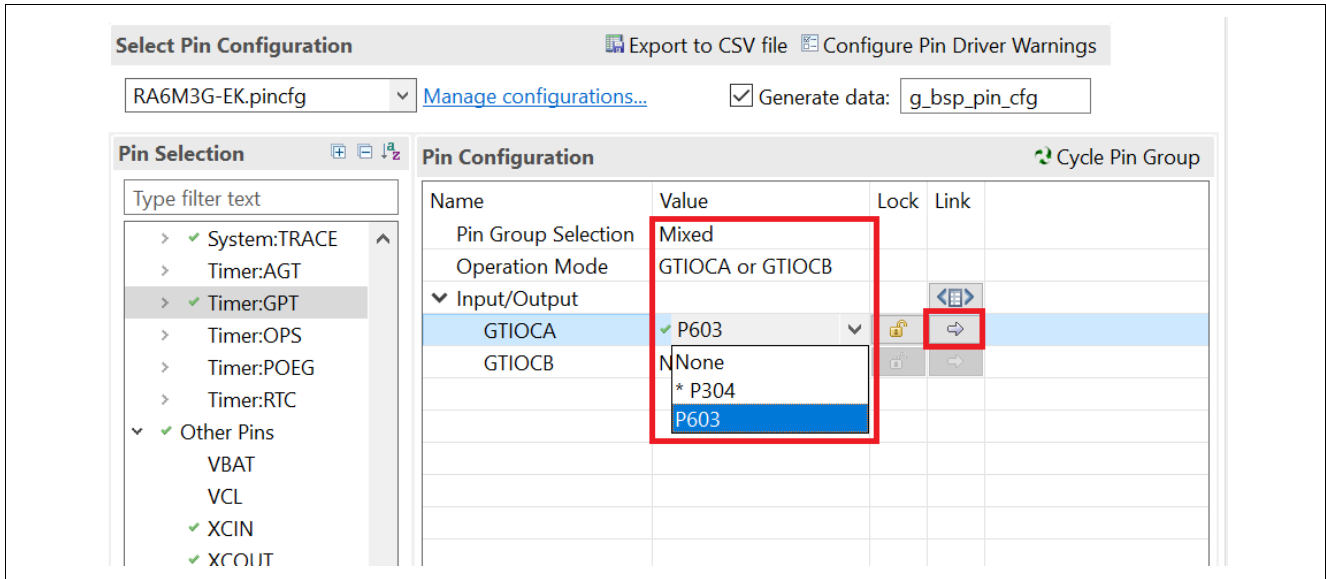


Figure 25. P603 Properties

19. After that you can hit the => sign to see the pin P603 settings.

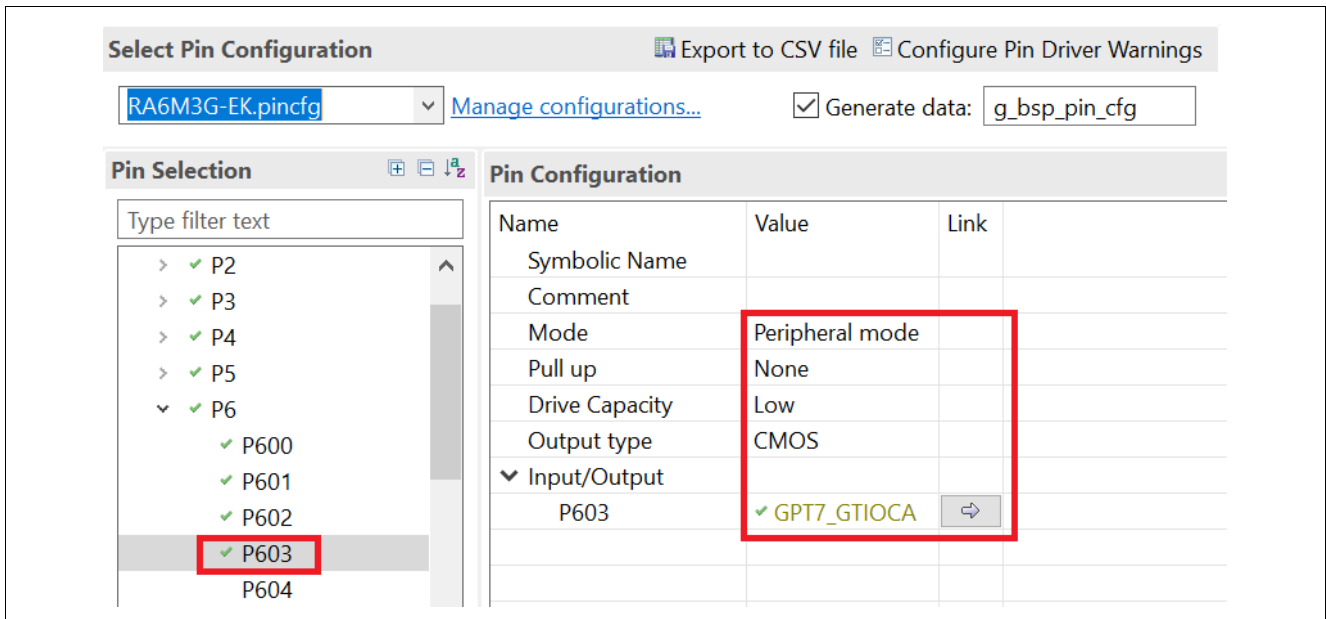


Figure 26. P603 Settings

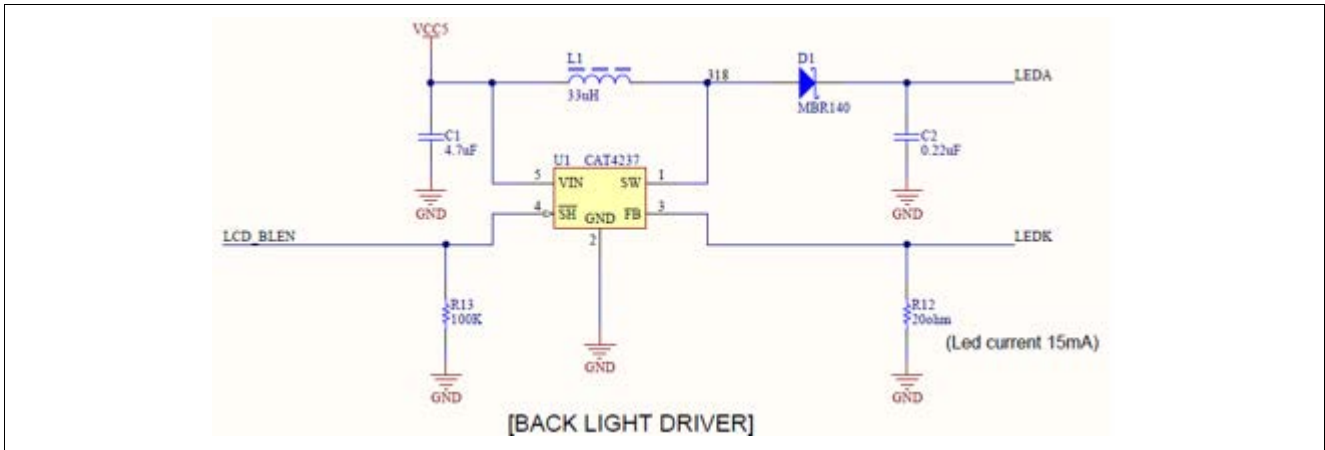


Figure 27. LCD_BLEN Schematic

3. Add and Configure “Touch Function Driver”

1. Add a **New Thread** and name it **Touch Thread** with the setting below.

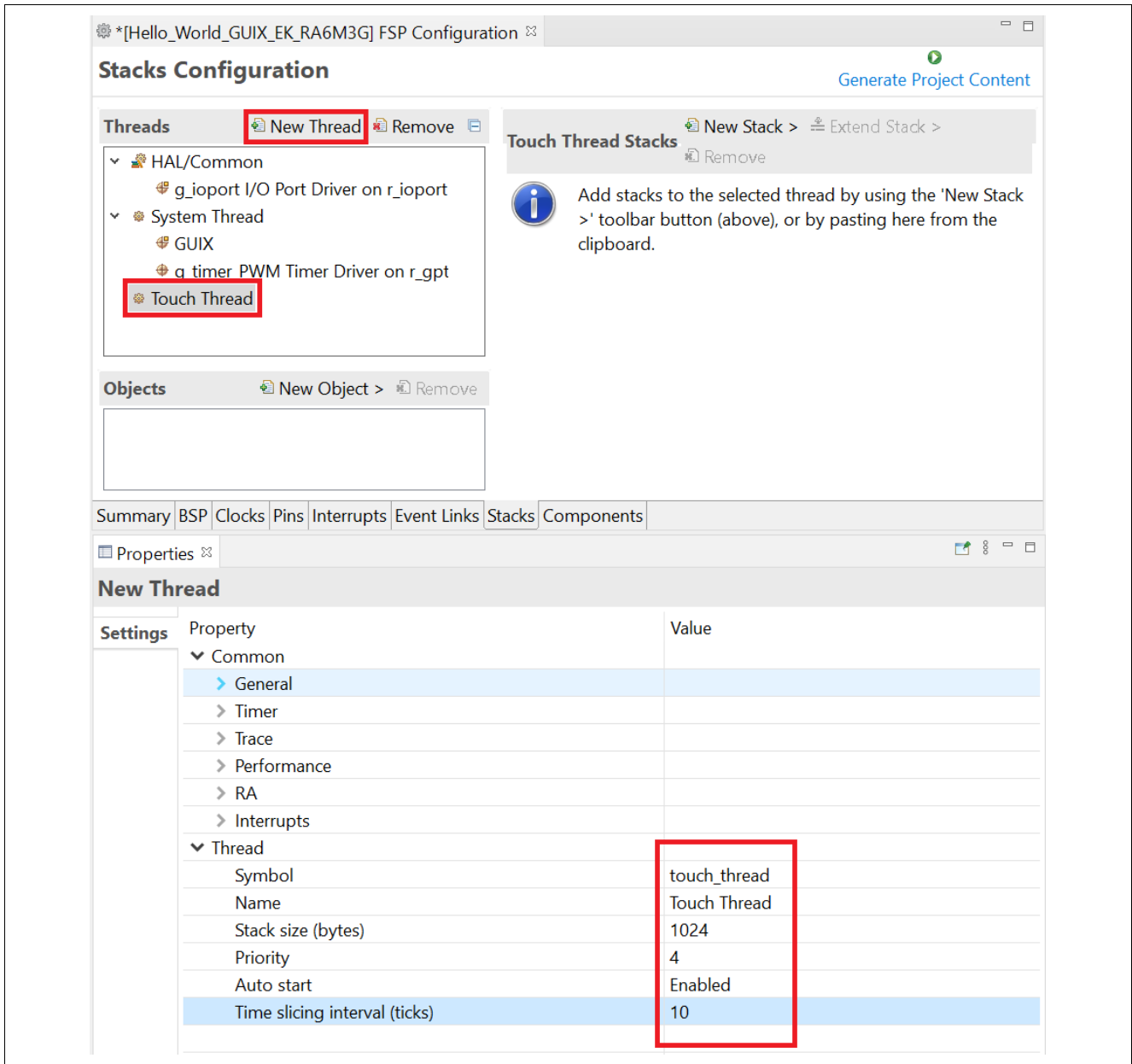


Figure 28. Create Touch Thread

2. Select **Touch Thread** and add new stack **External IRQ Driver on r_icu**. **New Stack > Driver > Input > External IRQ Driver on r_icu**.

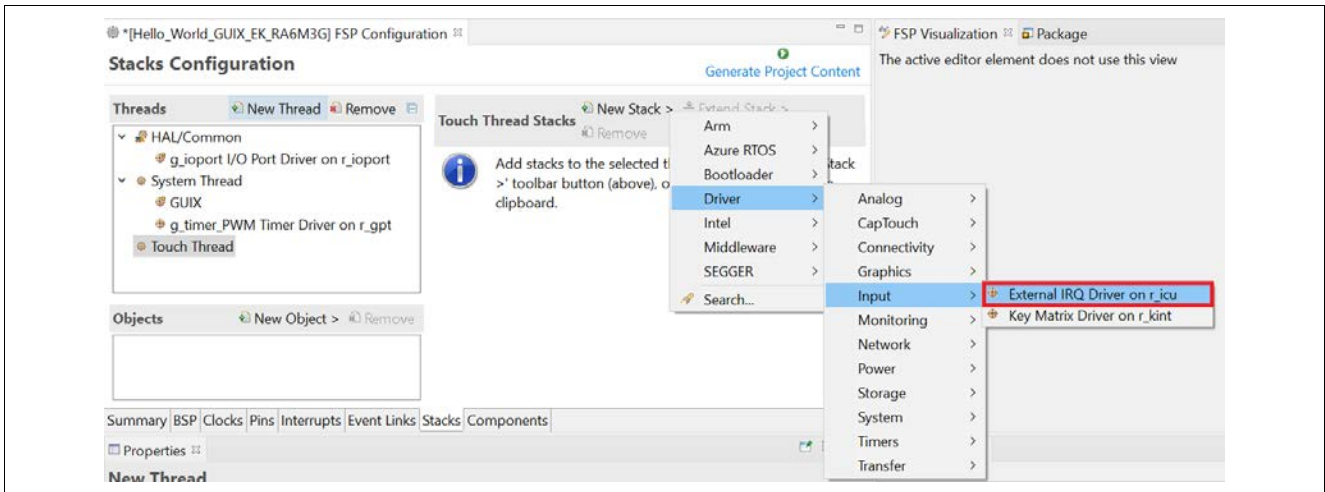


Figure 29. Add External IRQ Driver on r_icu

3. User should disable the pin P206 before we move to the next step. Click the **Pins** tab and follow the image below.

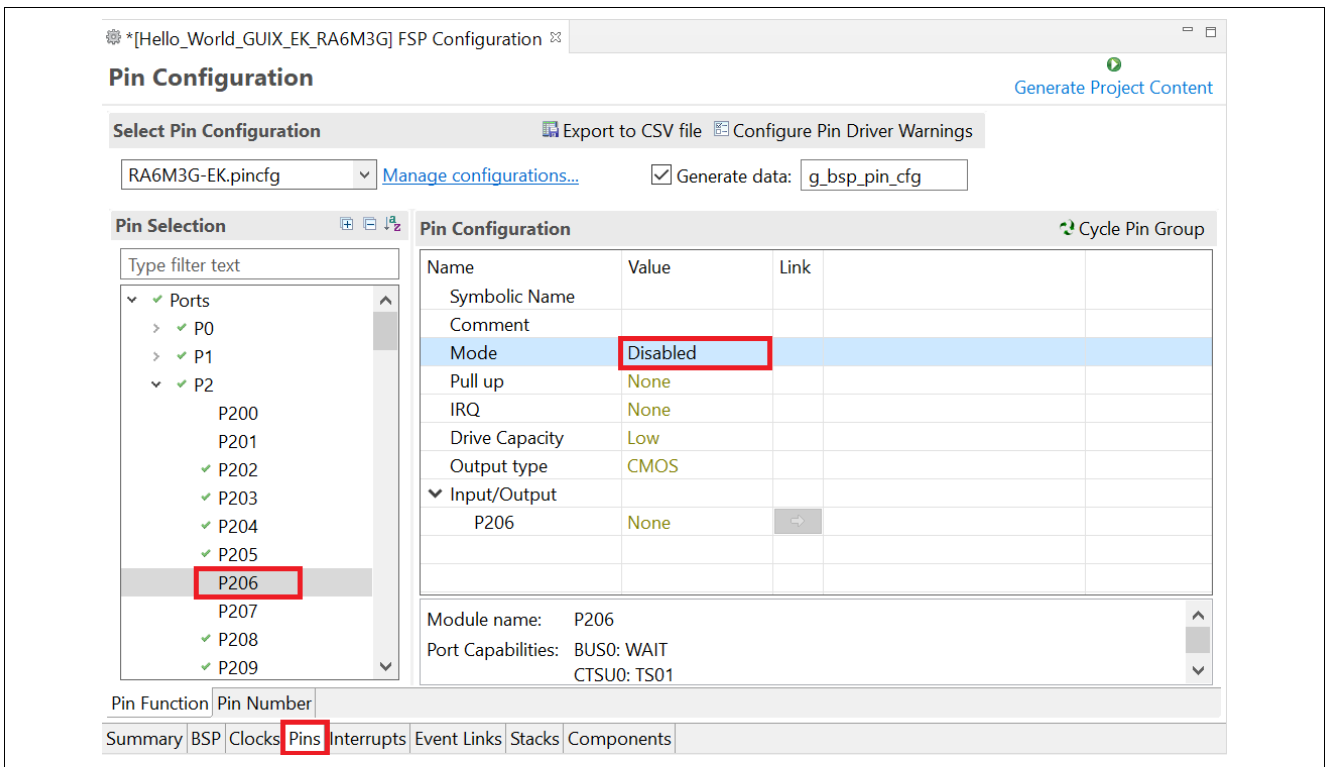


Figure 30. Disable Pin P206

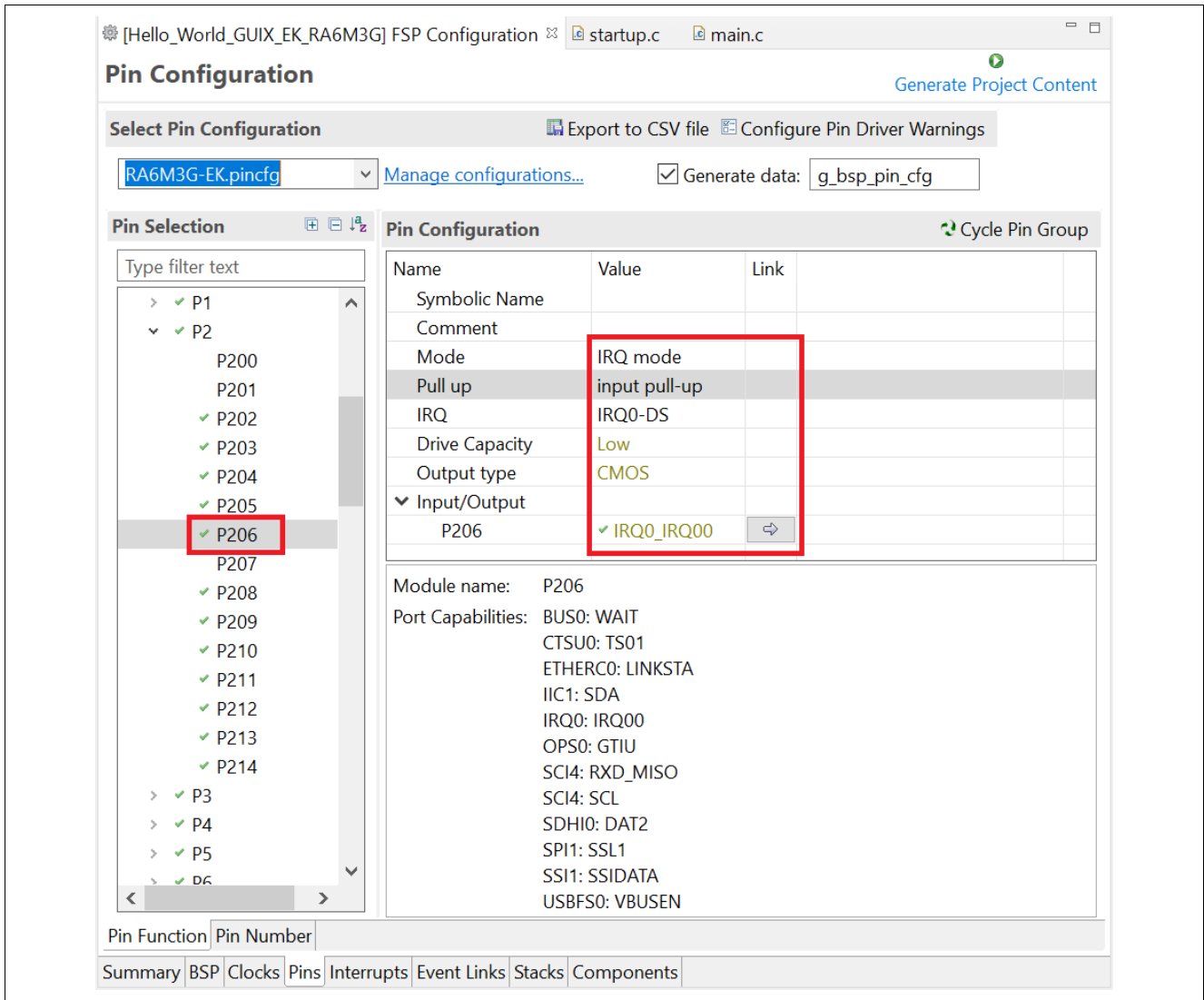


Figure 32. Configure Pin P206

6. Select **Touch Thread** and add a new stack. **New Stack > Driver > Connectivity > I2C Master Driver on r_iic_master** on **r_iic_master**.

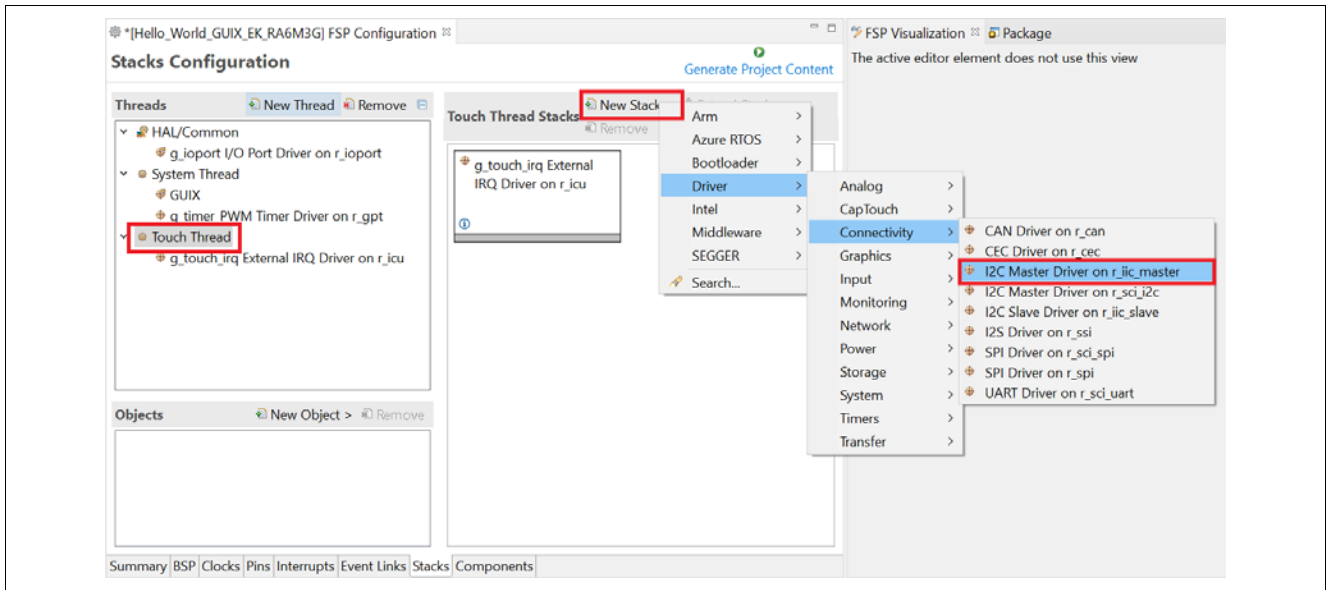


Figure 33. Add I2C Master Driver on r_iic_master

7. Setting the properties for **g_i2c_touch I2C Master Driver on r_iic_master**.

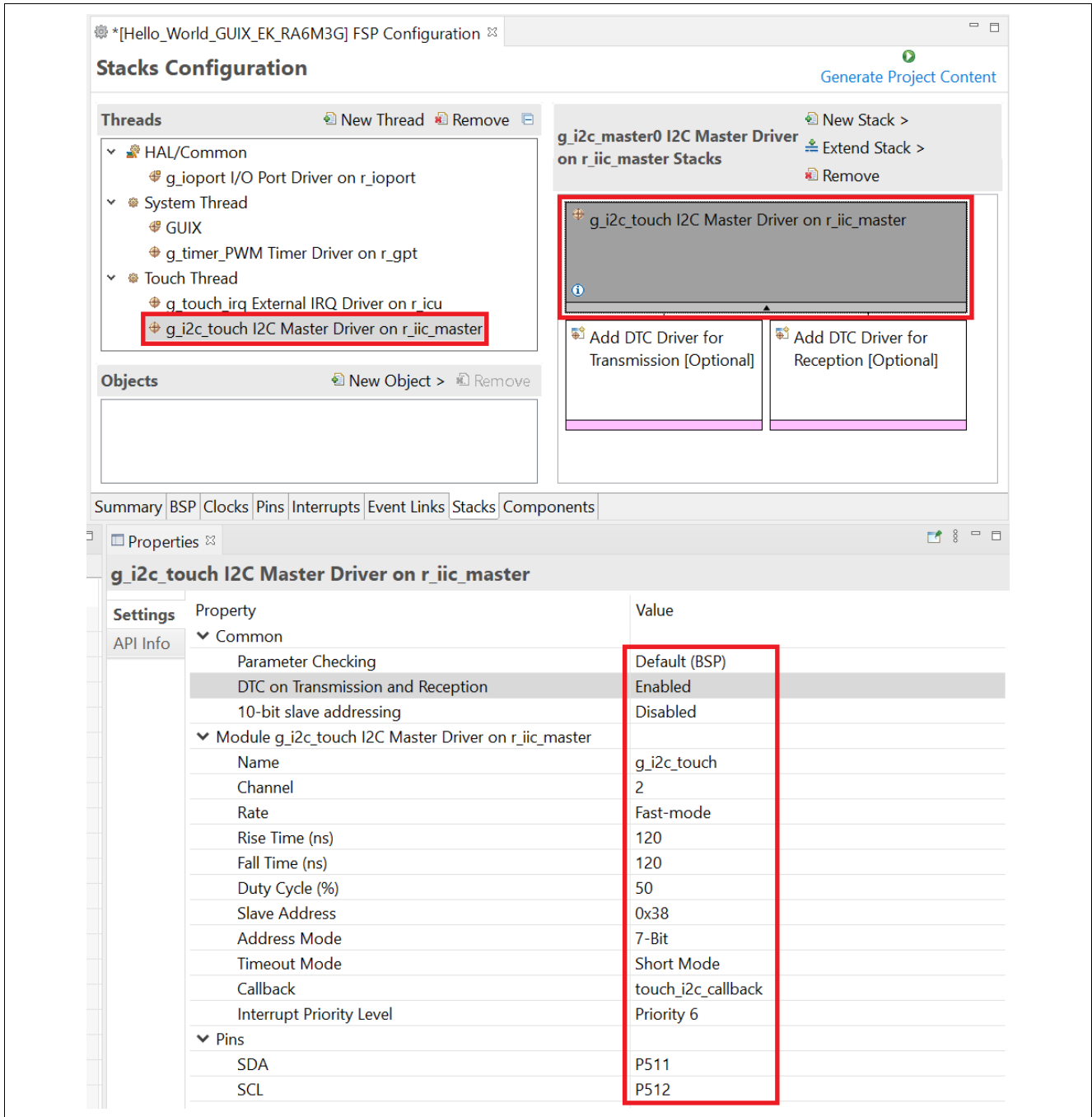


Figure 34. Set Properties for **g_i2c_touch I2C Master Driver on r_iic_master**

- Under **g_i2c_touch I2C Master Driver on r_iic_master** add in **Add DTC Driver for Transmission**. Also, set properties for **Add DTC Driver for Transmission**.

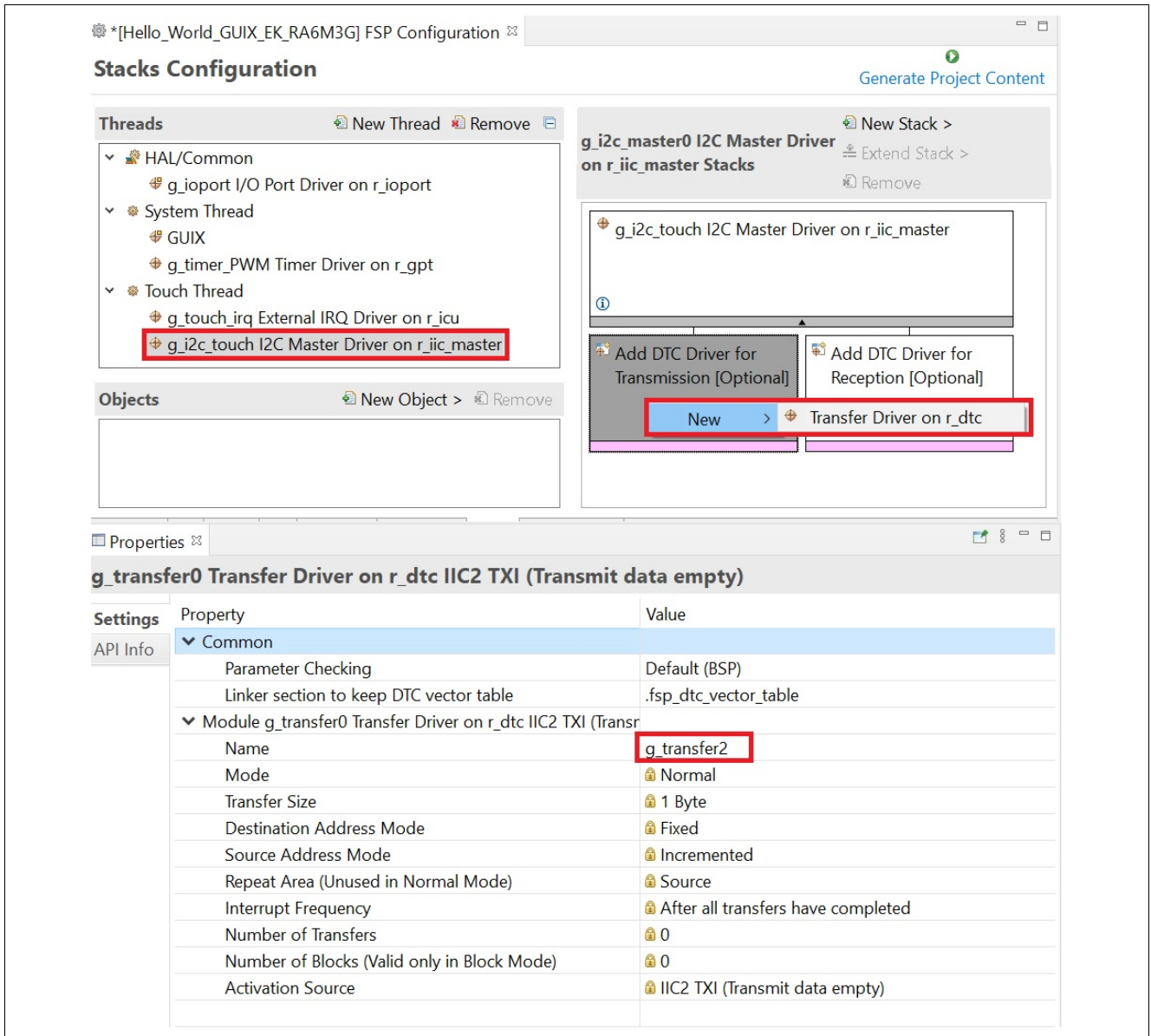


Figure 35. Add DTC Driver for Transmission

9. Add in **Add DTC Driver for Reception**. Then set properties for **Add DTC Driver for Reception**.

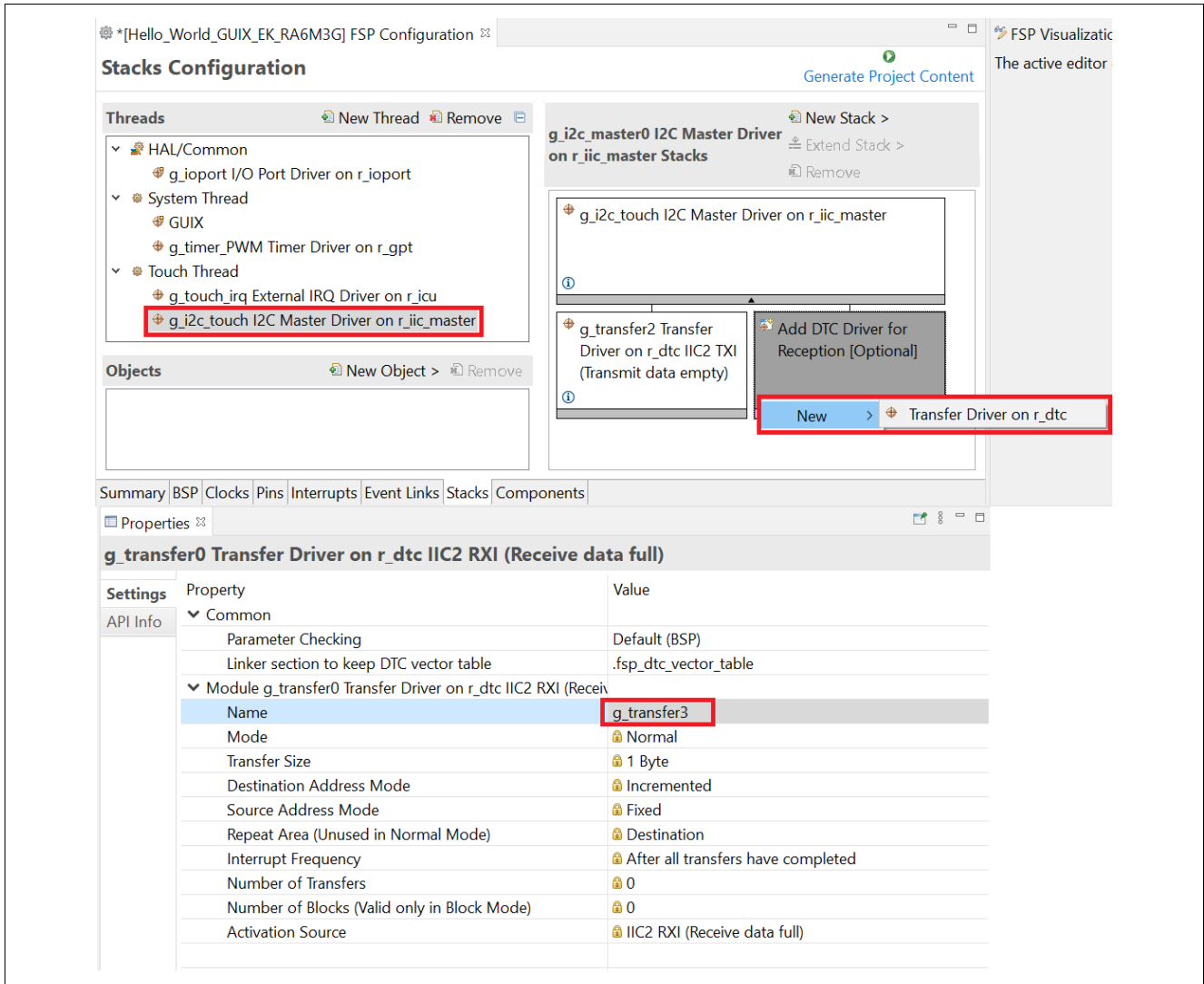


Figure 36. Add DTC Driver for Reception

10. After adding transmission and reception, the configuration looks like below.

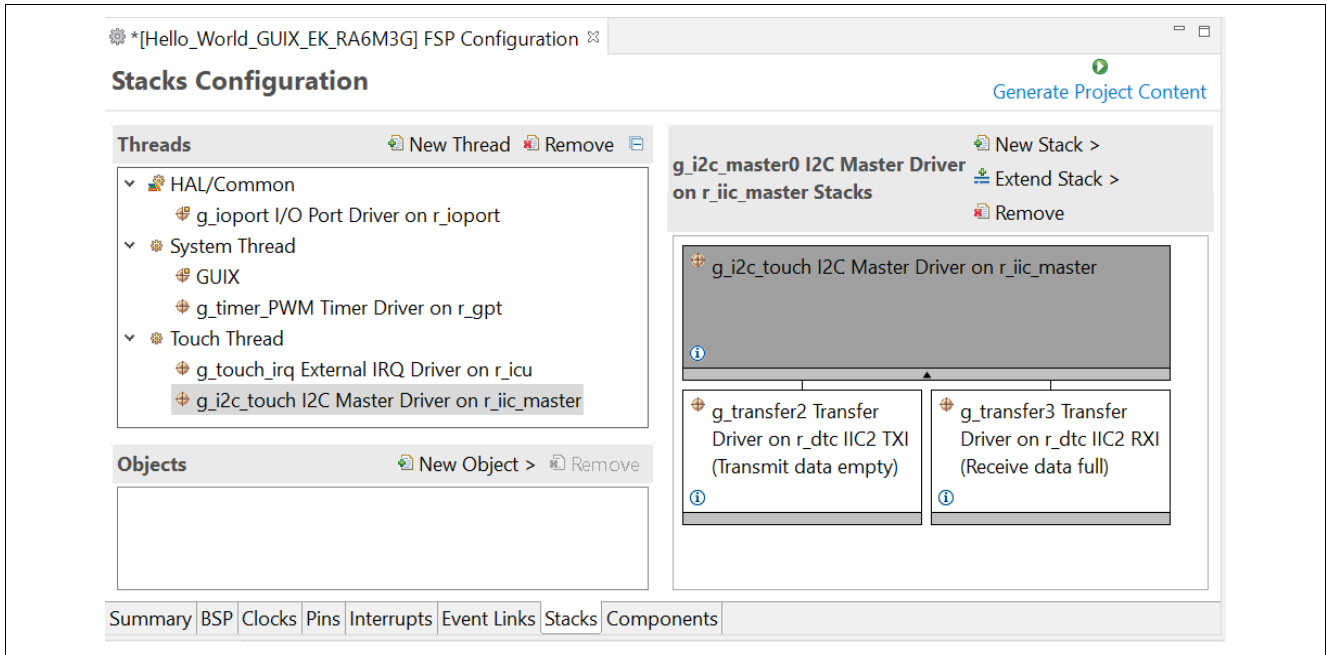


Figure 37. Configuration for Transmission and Reception

11. From the **Objects** window, click on **New Object** and select **Semaphore**. Then set **g_touch_semaphore Semaphore** properties.

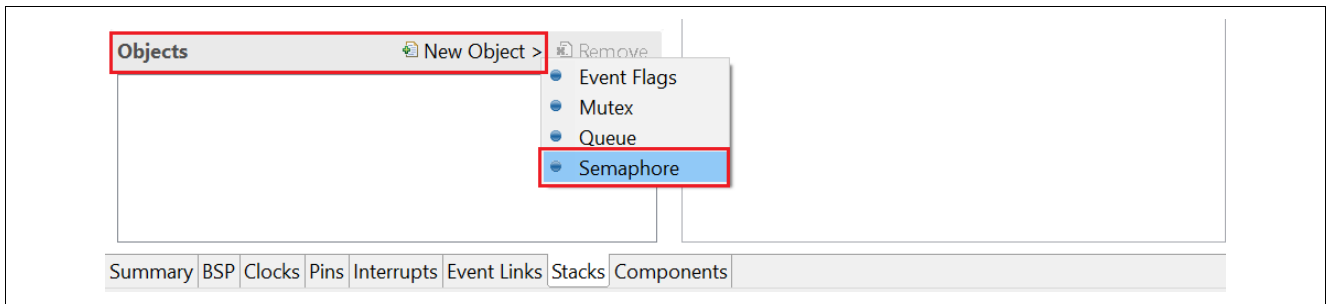


Figure 38. Add Semaphore

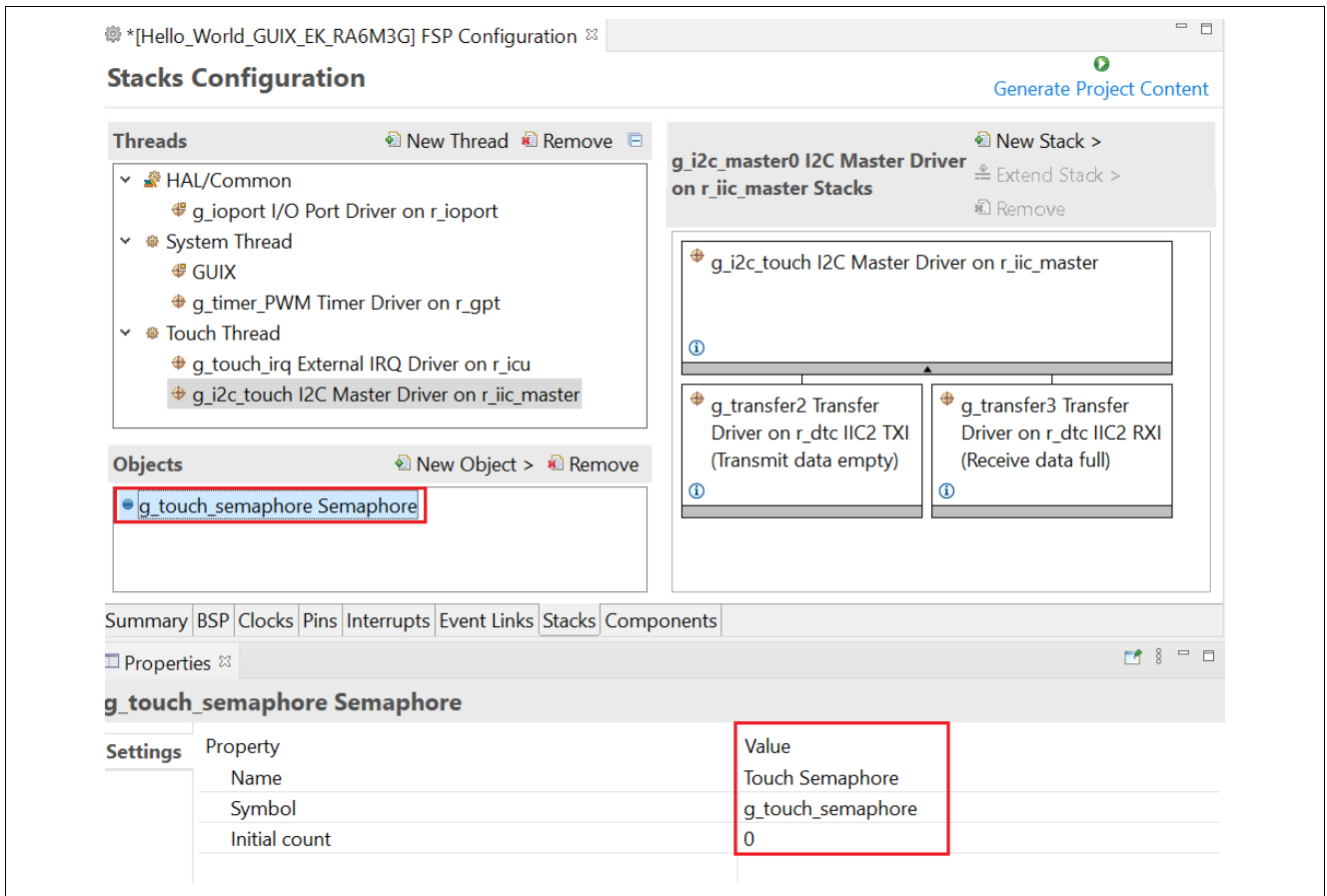


Figure 39. Set g_touch_semaphore Semaphore Properties

12. Again, from the **Objects** window. Click on **New Object** and select **Semaphore**. Then set **g_i2c_semaphore** Semaphore properties.

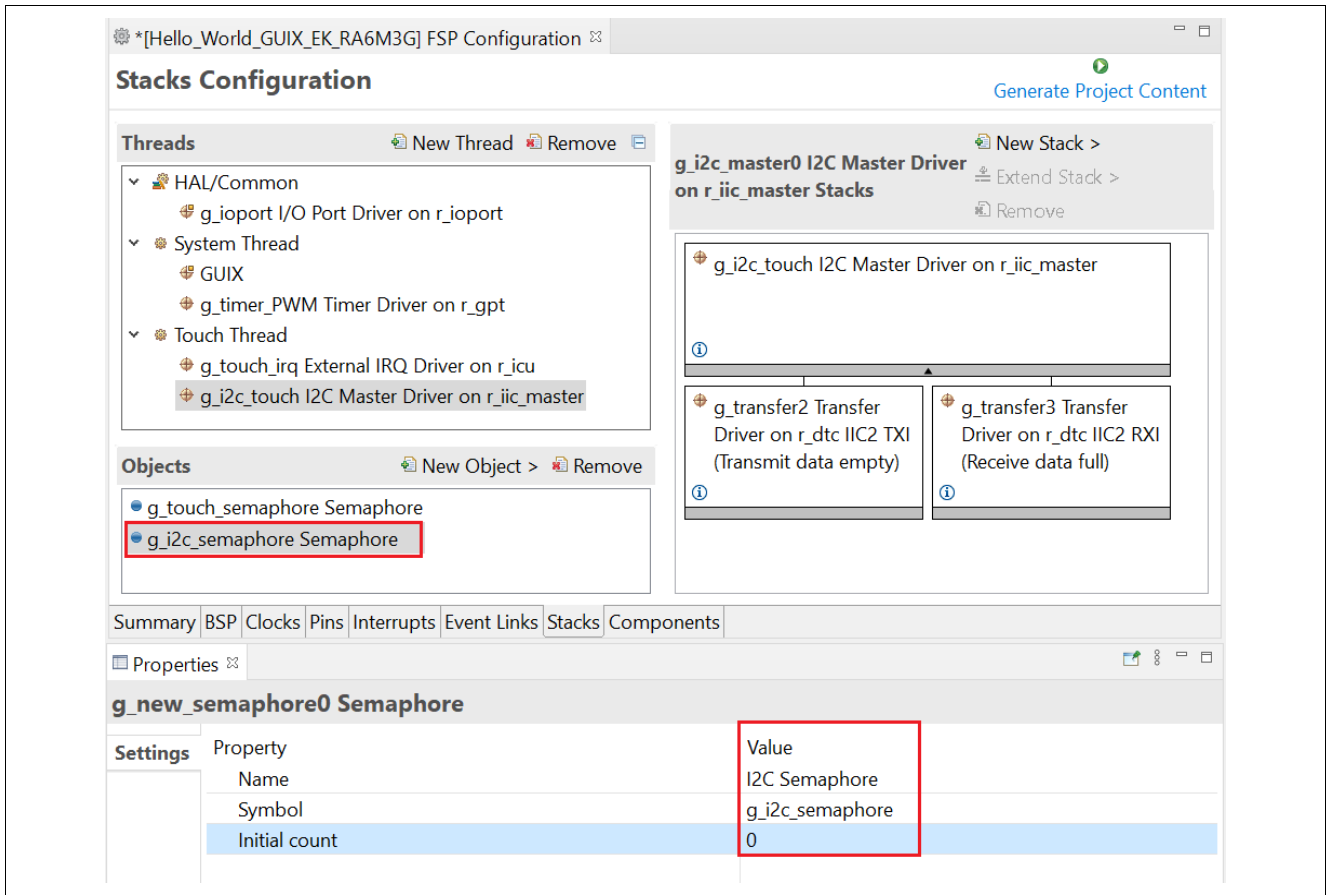


Figure 40. Add Semaphore

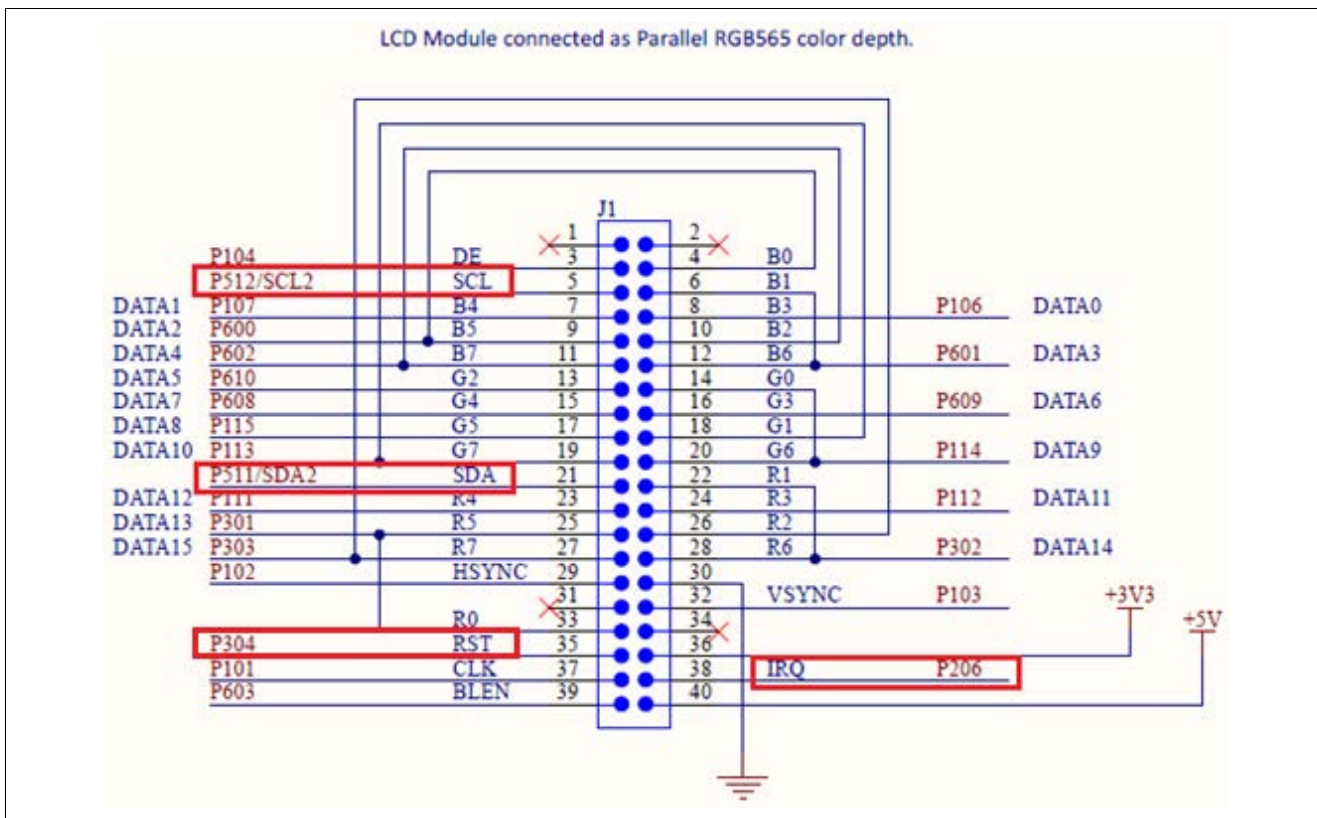


Figure 41. Set g_i2c_semaphore Semaphore Properties

The pins marked in red above are used for the touch panel controller on the LCD board:

- IRQ0 interrupt (P206) is used to trigger touch events.
- I2C channel 2 (P512, P511) is used to read and write data to the touch controller.
- Touch driver folder touch_ft5x06 for touch function is inside the provided Source folder.
- P304 is used to reset the LCD's touch controller.

13. Since the IRQ0 (P206) needs a pull-up to function properly with the LCD board, don't change the setting that was done by FSP, as shown below.

15. In RA Configurator, click [Generate Project Content](#) to generate project content.

4. Create Folders in the Hello_World GUIX_EK_RA6M3G Project for Azure RTOS GUIX Studio Project

1. Under folder `src` create a new folder and name it `guix_gen`. Follow the image below, then click **Finish**.

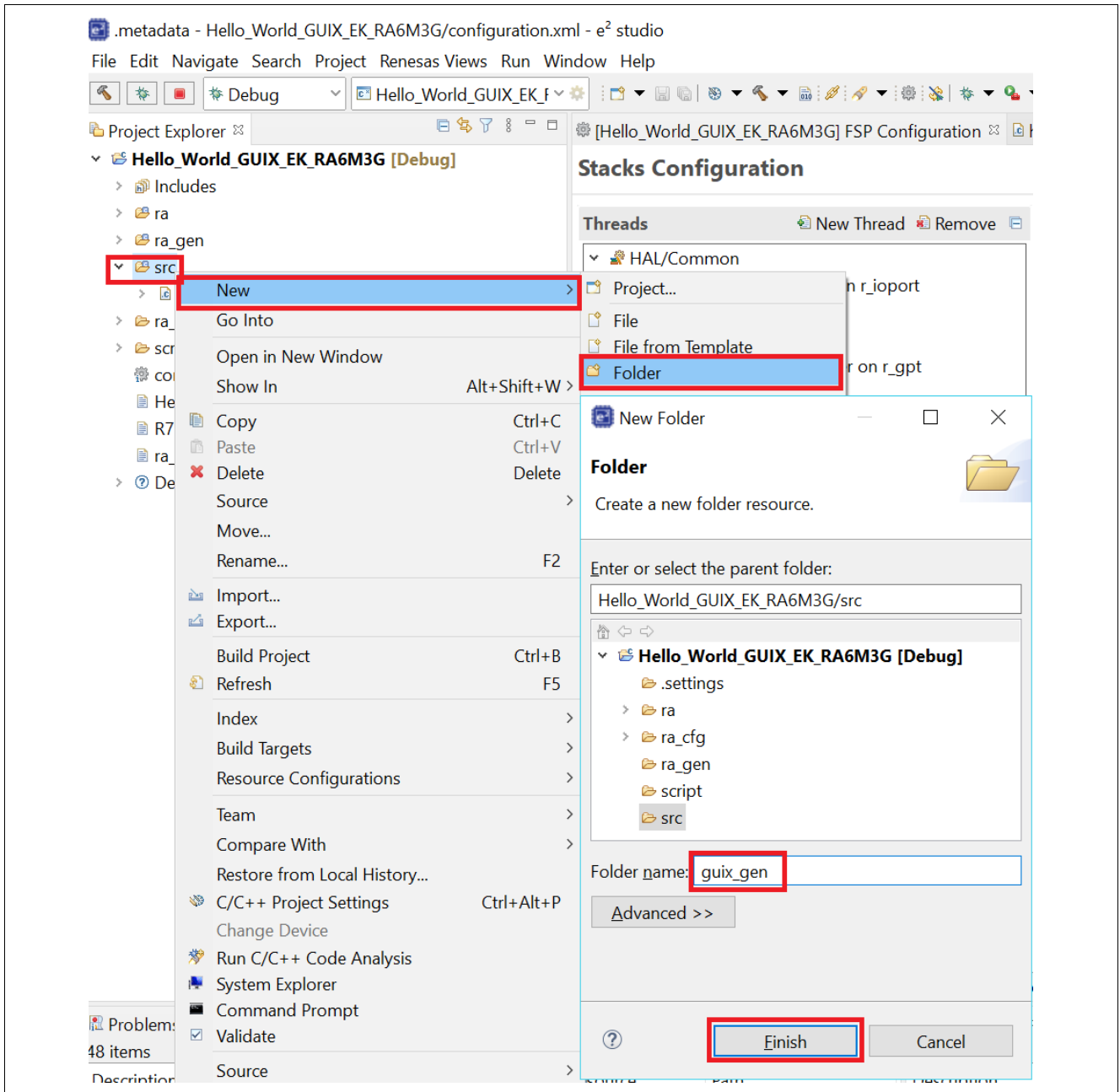


Figure 43. Create guix_gen Folder

- 2. Under folder `src` create a new folder and name it `guix_studio`. Then follow the image below and click **Finish**.

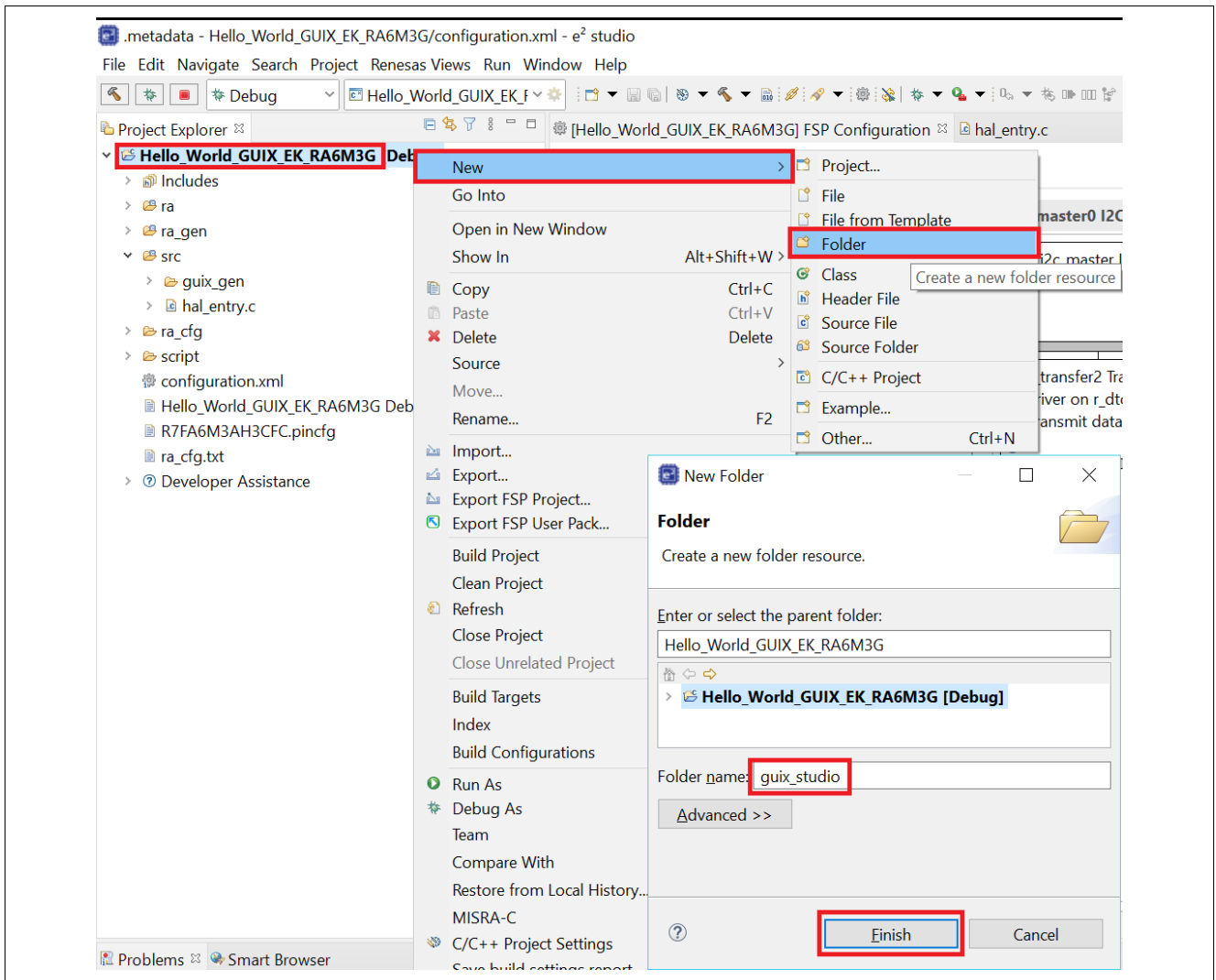


Figure 44. Create `guix_studio` Folder

- Go to the Hello_World_GUIX_EK_RA6M3G project. Select the `guix_studio` folder, right-click and select **Resource configuration**, then select **Exclude from Build...** since it contains the Azure GUIX Studio project, which won't be built by FSP.

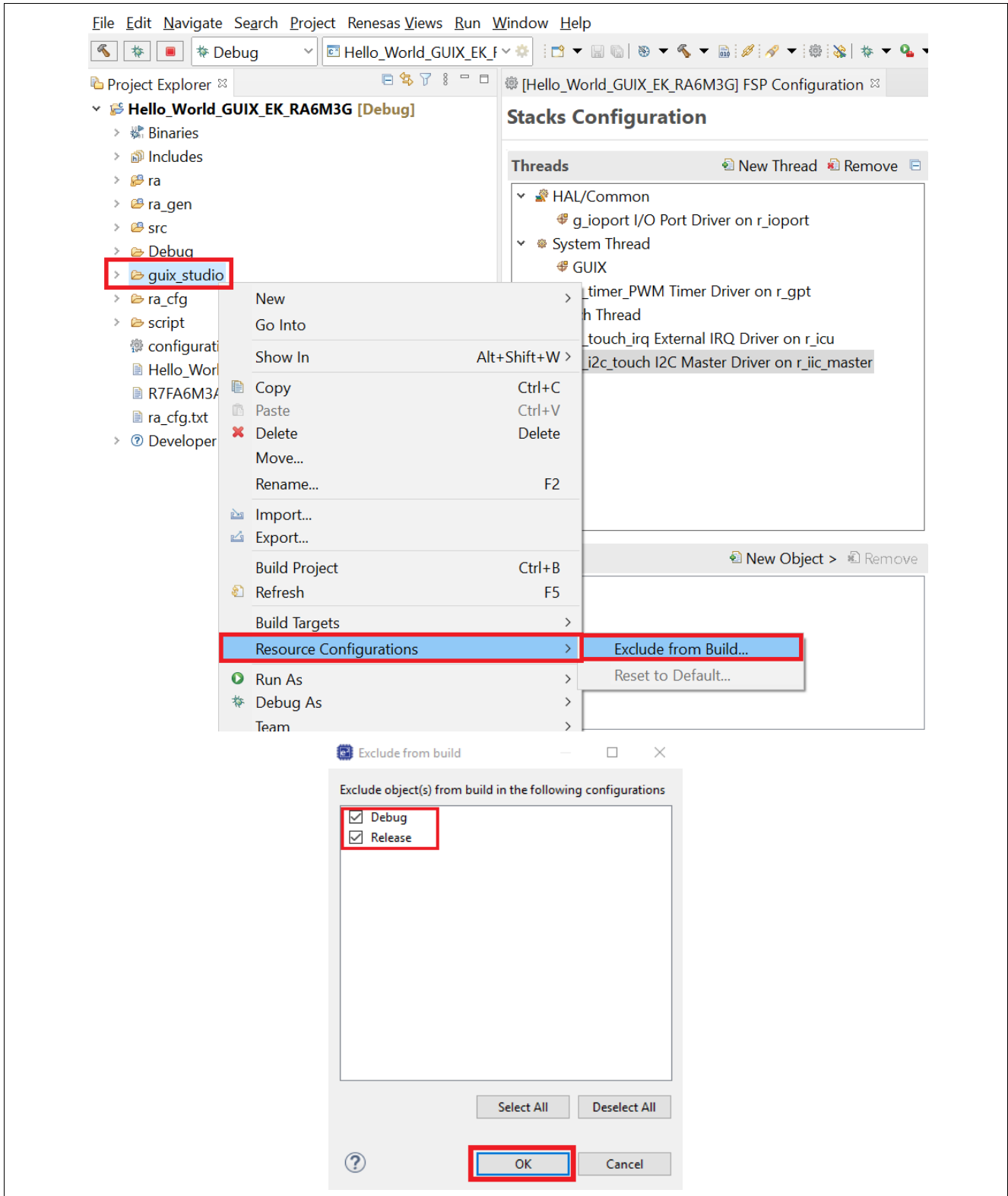


Figure 45. Exclude guix_studio from Build

- Under folder `guix_studio` that was created earlier, create a new folder and name it `GNU`. Follow the image below, then click **Finish**.

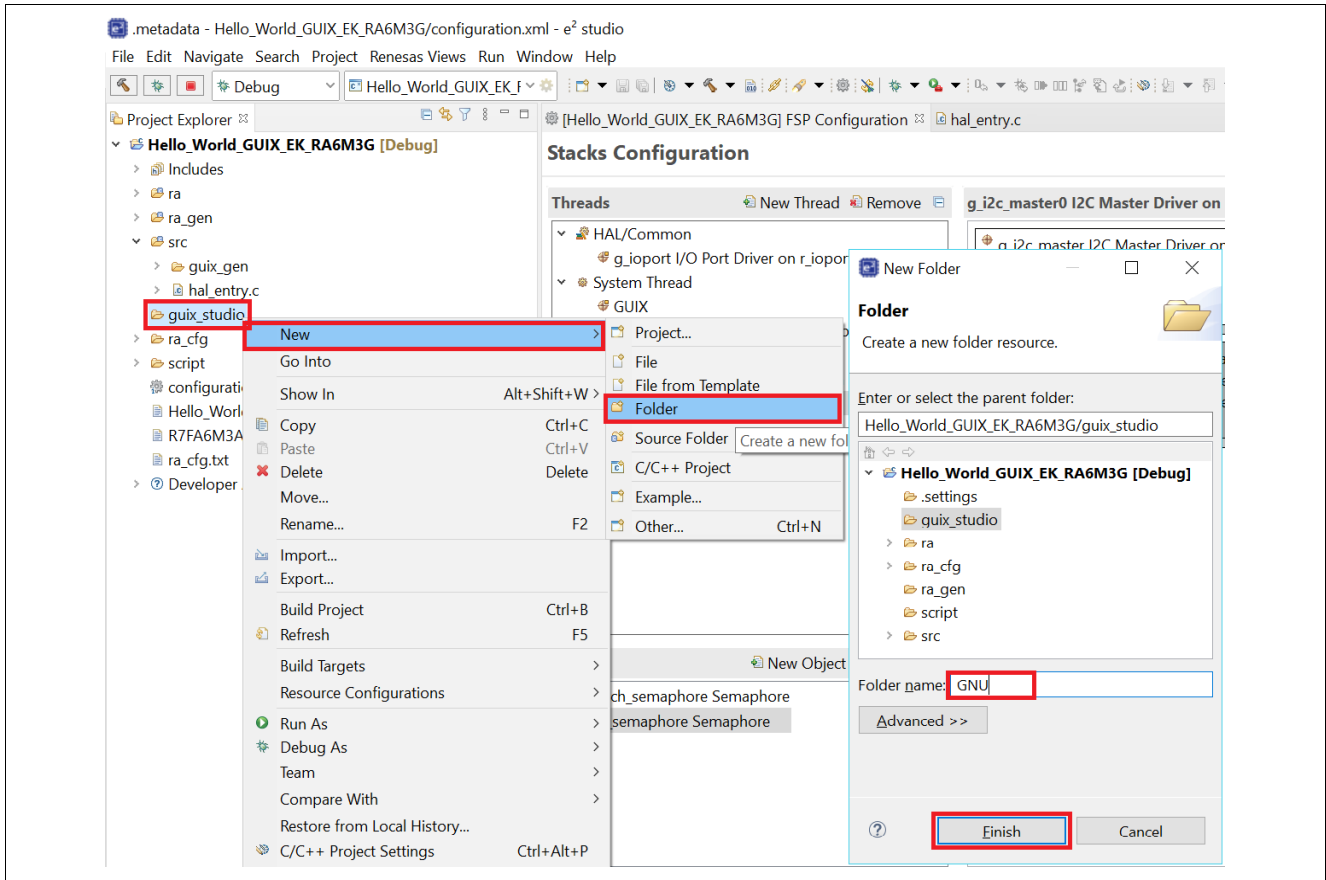


Figure 46. Create GNU Folder

5. After the sub-folder GNU is created, the folder structure should look like the image below.

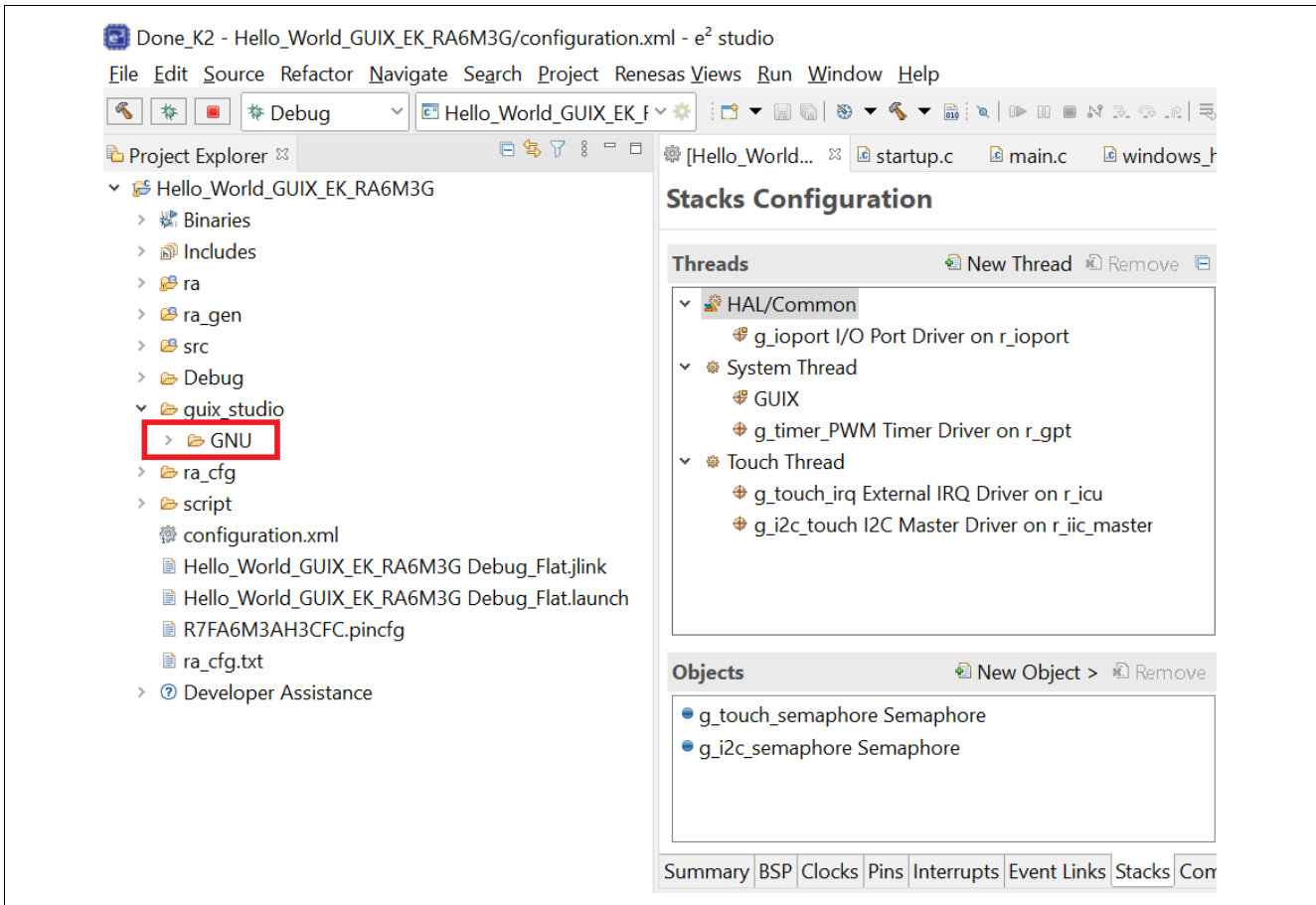


Figure 47. After GNU Folder is Created

6. Unzip and open the provided folder `Source.zip`. Copy the four `*.c` files and one folder `touch_ft5x06` and paste into the folder `src` of your project **Hello_World_GUIX_EK_RA6M3G**.
 - `Touch_ft5x06` folder
 - `hal_entry.c`
 - `system_thread_entry.c`
 - `touch_thread_entry.c`
 - `windows_handler.c`

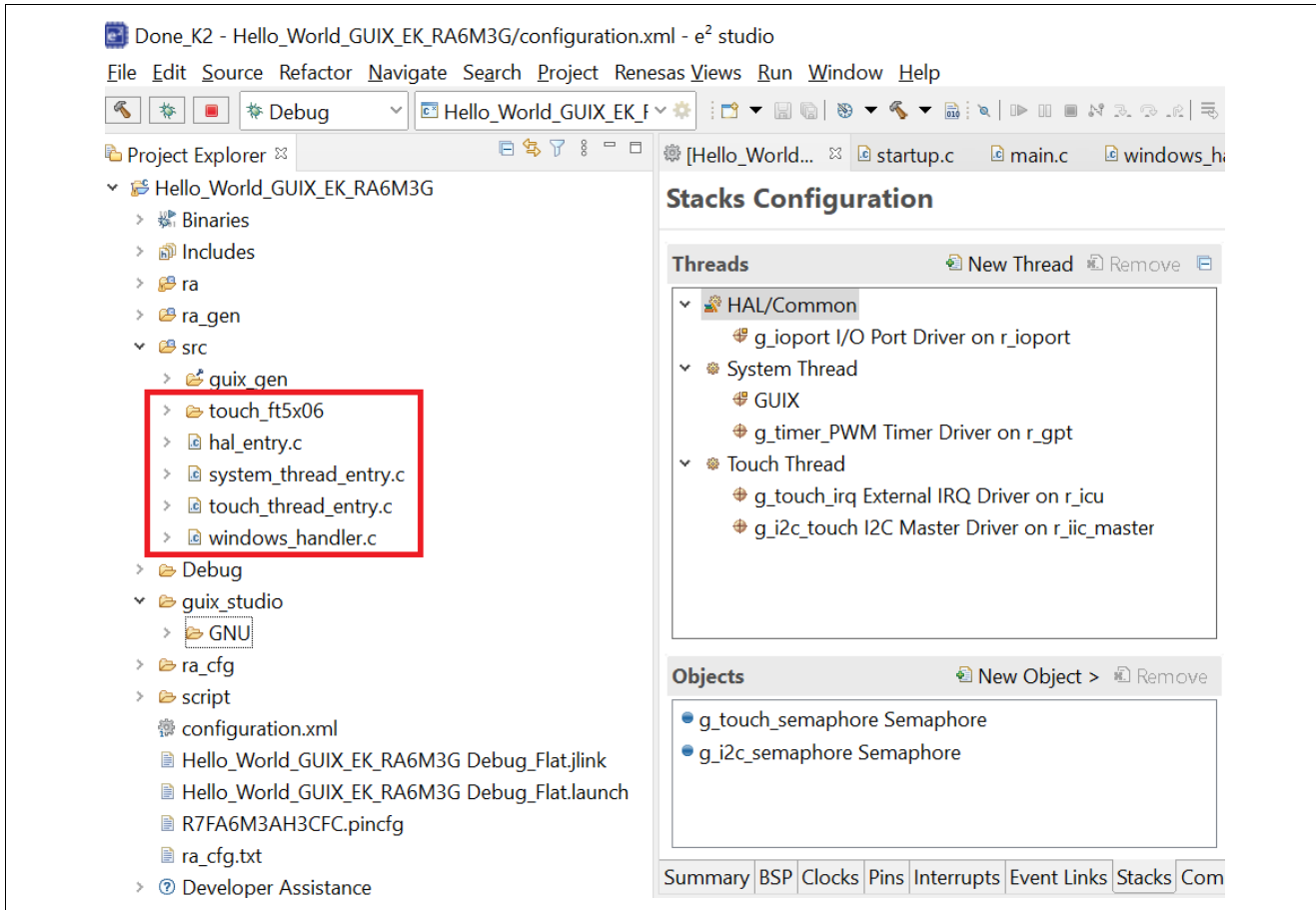


Figure 48. Files Copied from Source.zip

5. Using Azure RTOS GUIX Studio create GUI Windows

1. Open Azure RTOS GUIX Studio v6.1.7 or greater.

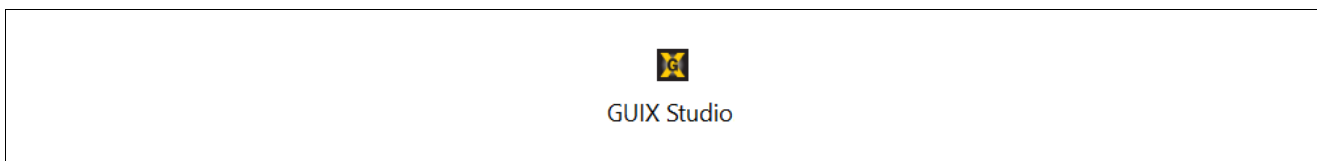


Figure 49. GUIX Studio Icon

2. Create a **New Project** and name it **Hello World**.
 - a. Select **Project**. From the drop-down list, select **New Project**.
 - b. Project Name: **Hello_World**.
 - c. Project Path: Browse to the location of the folder you created in the **Hello_World_GUIX_EK_RA6M3G > guix_studio\GNU** as shown in the image below.
 - d. Hit **OK** button and then the **Save** button to confirm your selections.

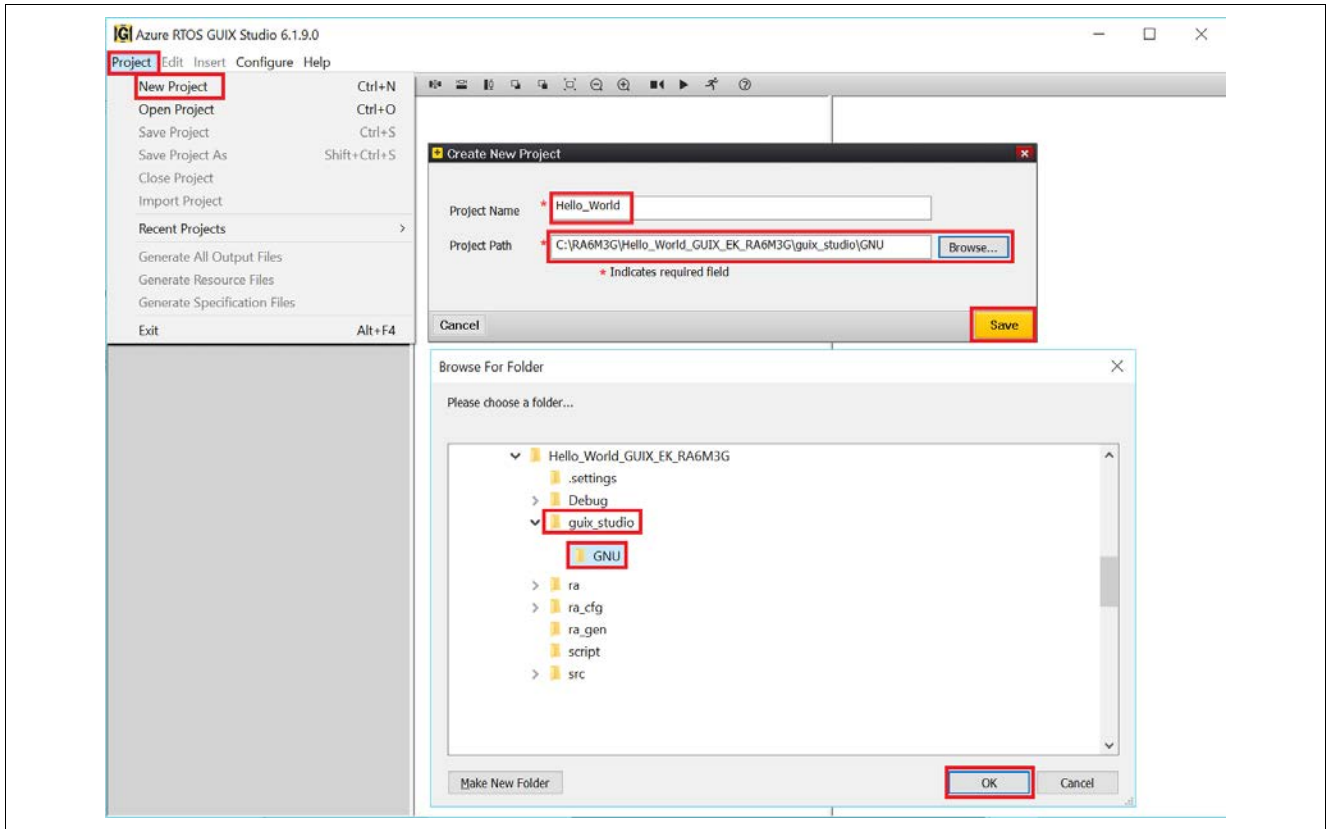


Figure 50. Create Hello World Project

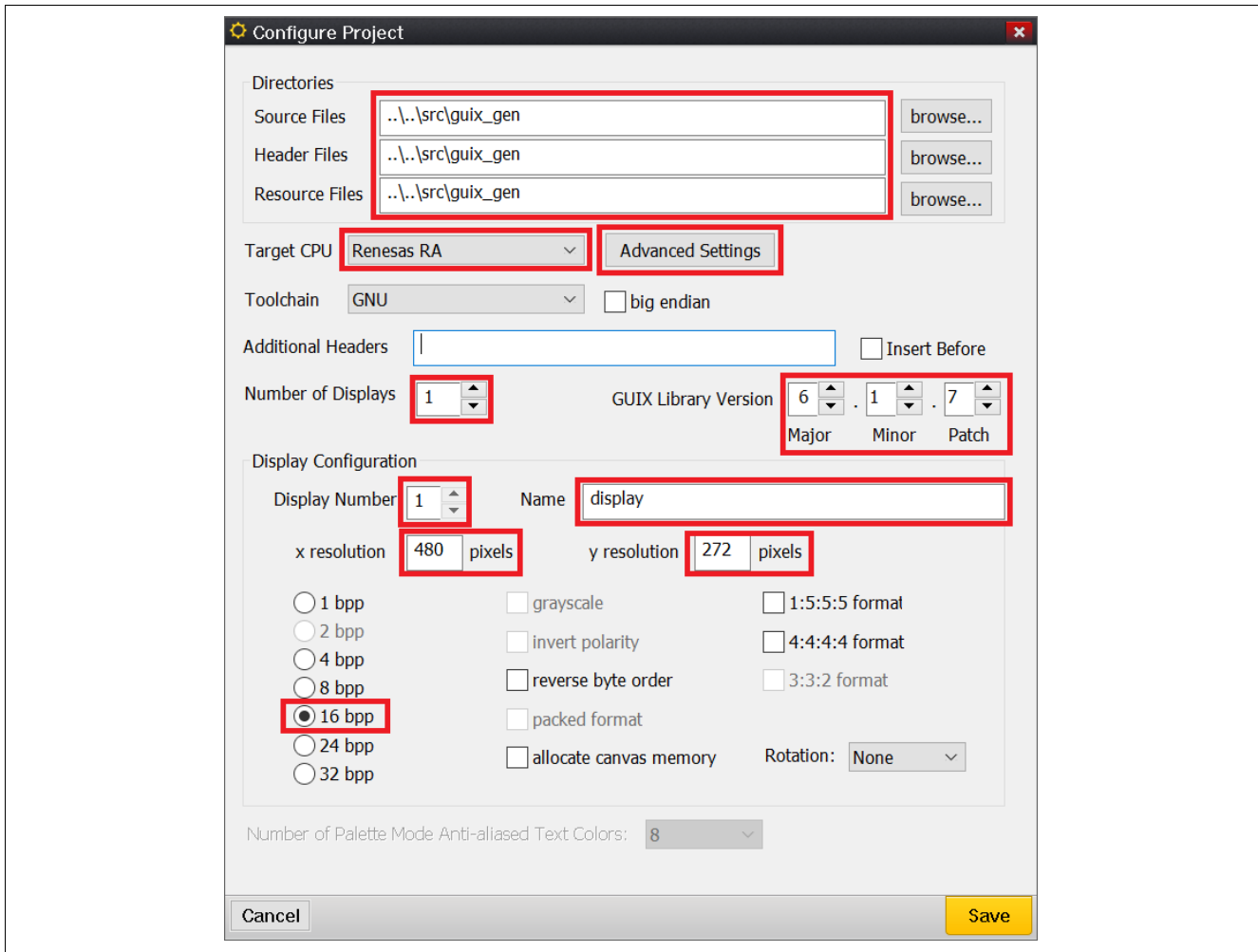


Figure 51. Configure Project

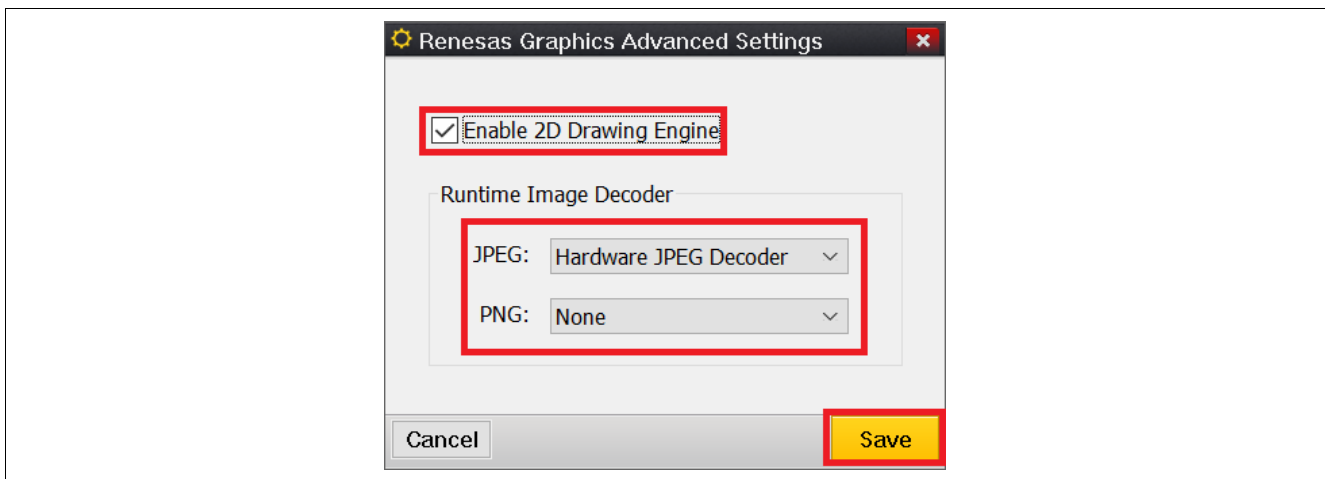


Figure 52. Advanced Settings

3. A new **Configure Project** window will pop up and you need to set all the options as shown in Figure 51 and Figure 52. Finally, click **Save**.

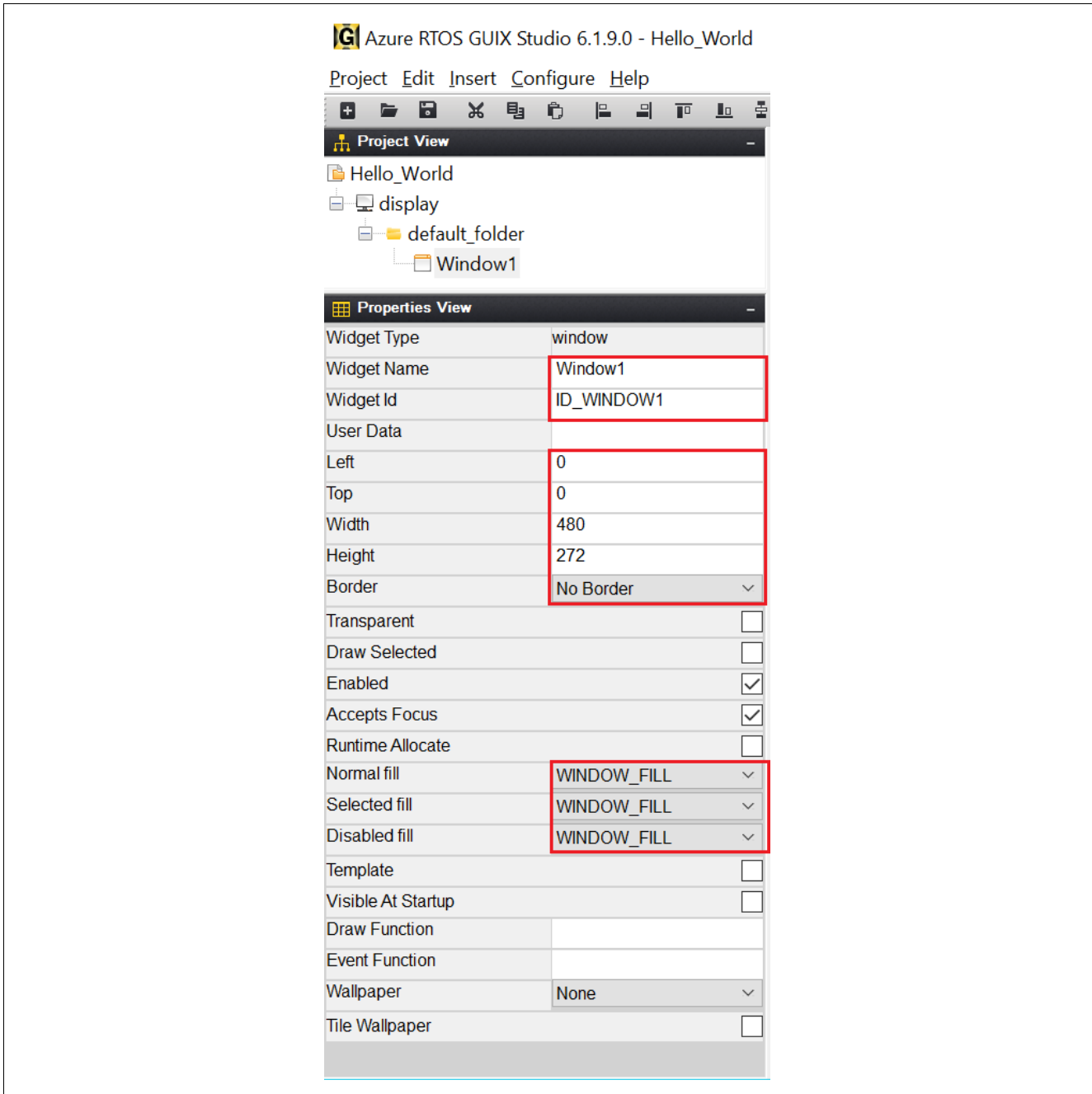


Figure 53. Property View of Window1

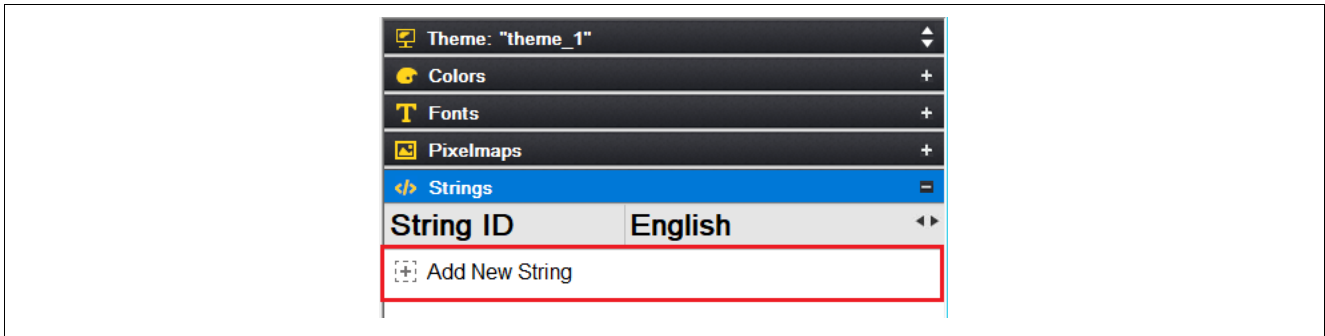


Figure 55. Add New String

A new **String Table Editor** window will pop up. Click the **Add String** button.

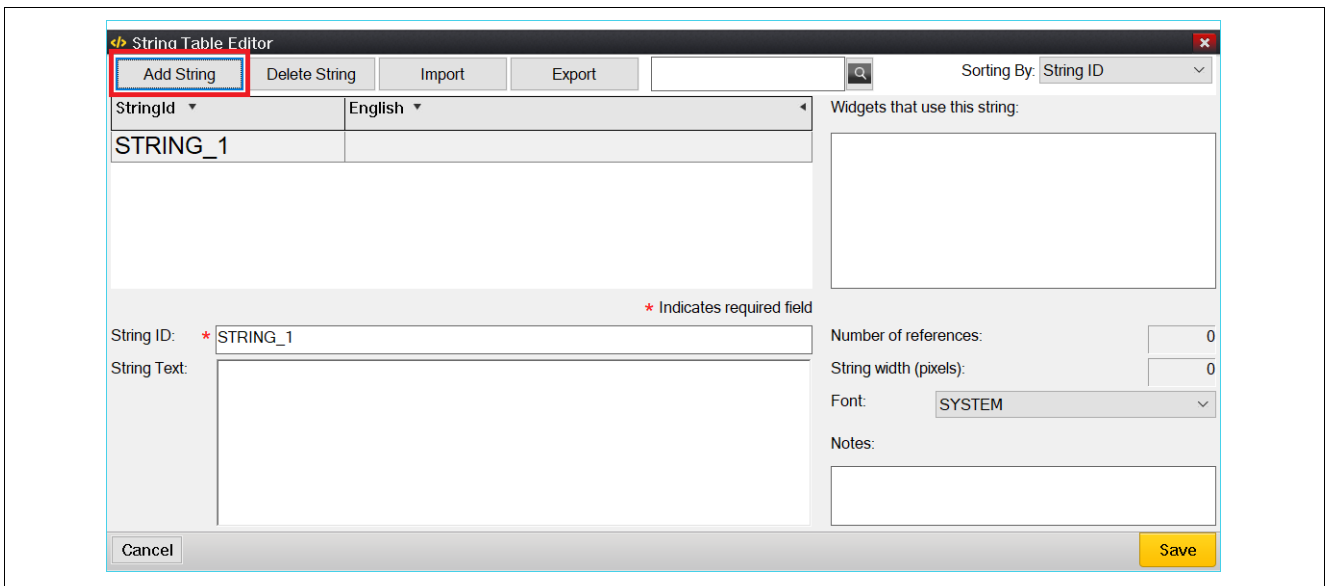


Figure 56. String Table Editor

5. Edit **String ID** and **String Text**.

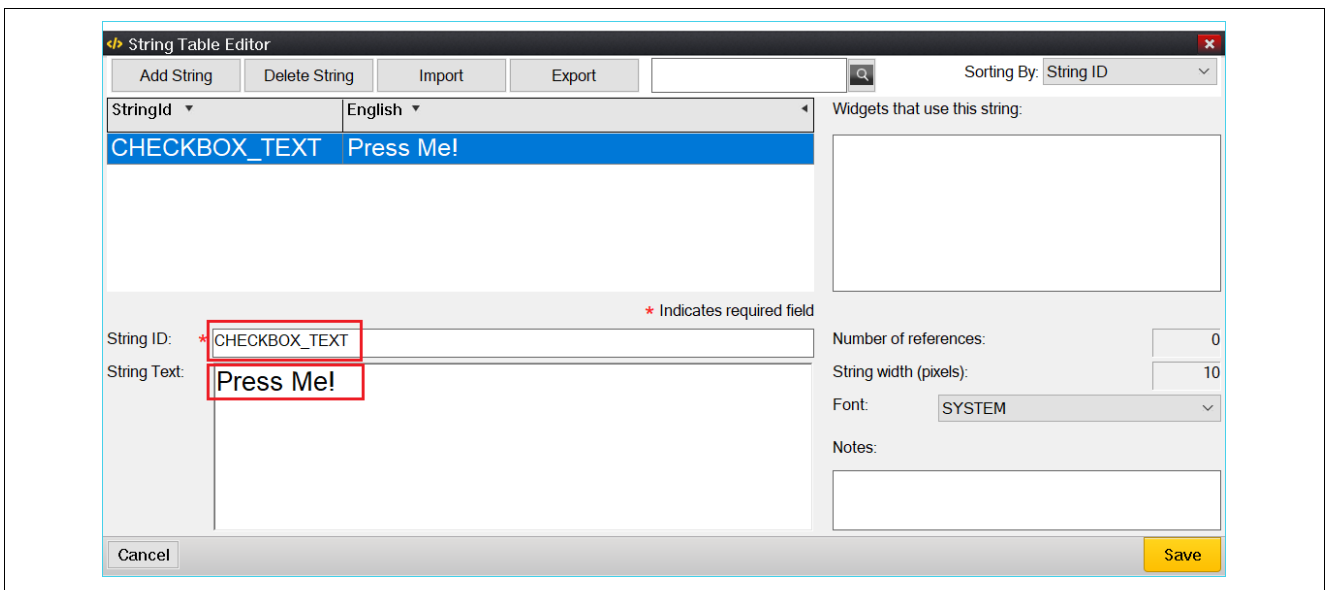


Figure 57. Edit String ID and String Text

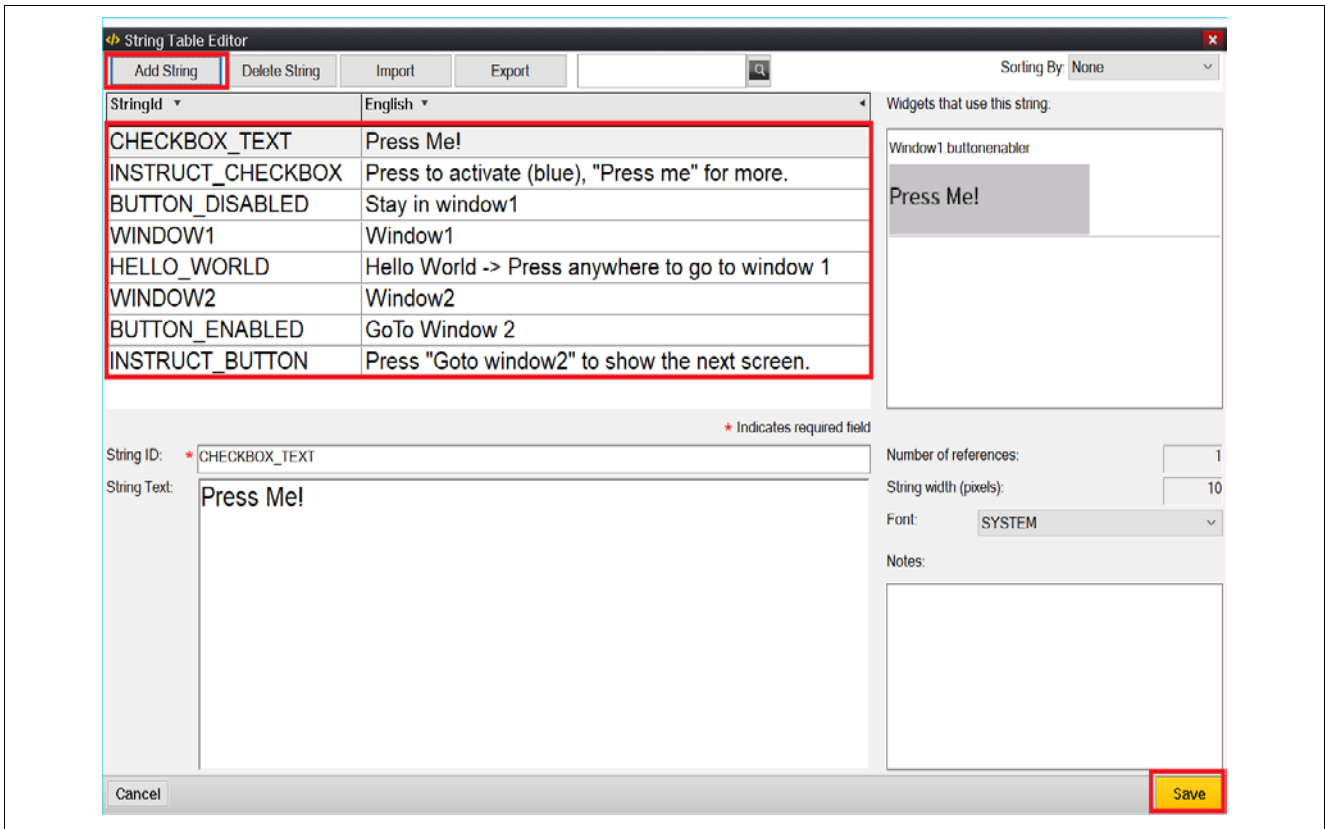


Figure 58. All Strings

- Continue to click **Adding String**, then edit **String ID** and **String Text** until the table appears like Figure 58. Then click the **Save** button

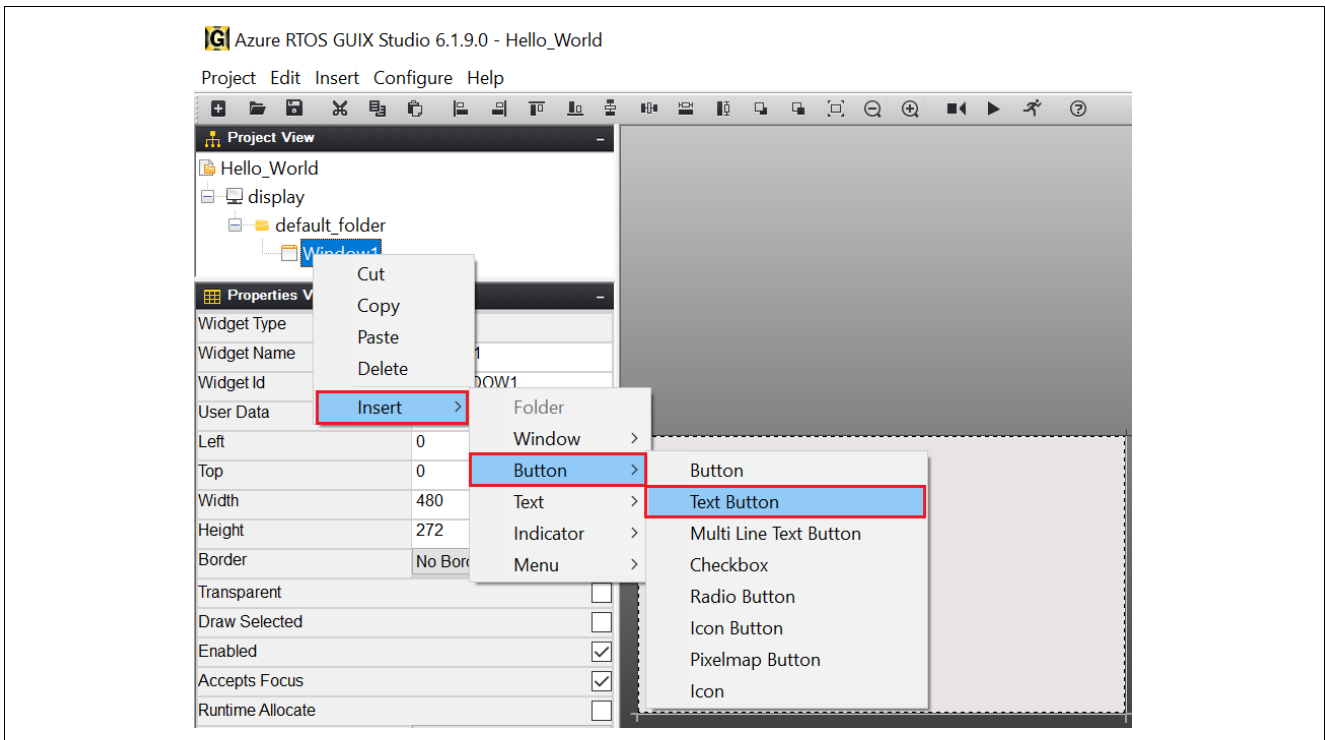


Figure 59. Insert Text Button

- Right-click on **Window1** to insert a **Text Button** and follow Figure 59.

7. Set **Properties View** of "ext_button".

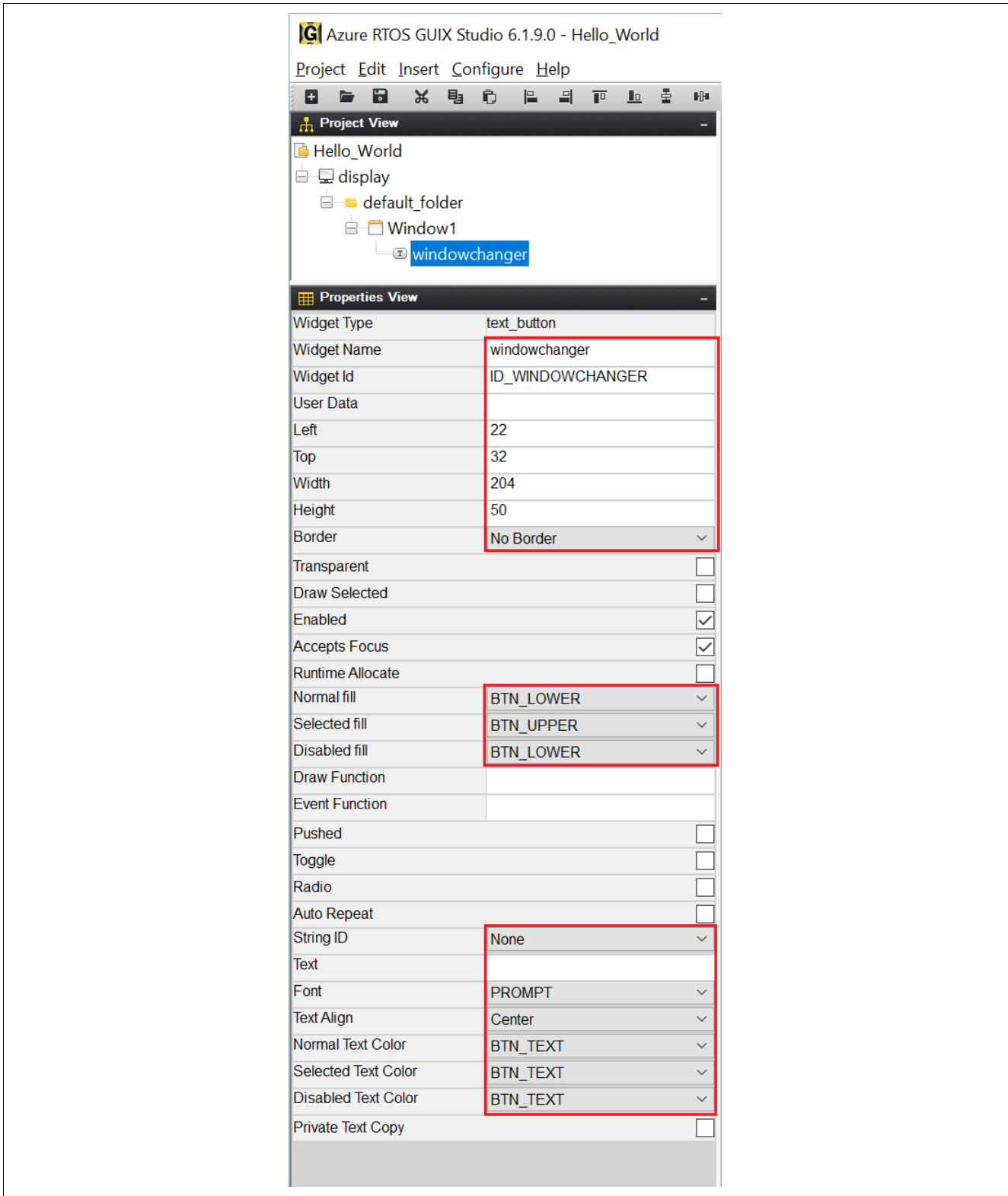


Figure 60. Properties View of text_button

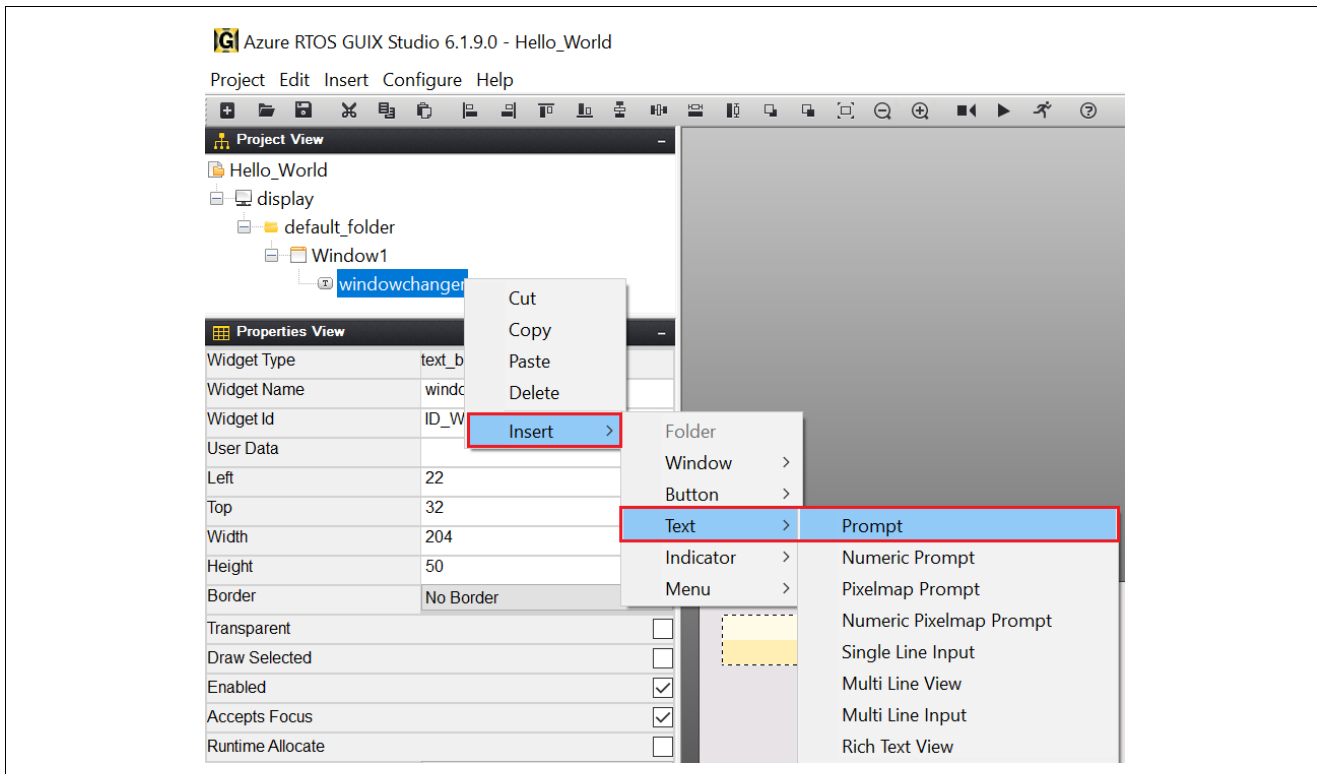


Figure 61. Insert Prompt

8. Right-click **windowchanger** to insert a **Prompt** and follow Figure 61.

9. Set Properties View of prompt.

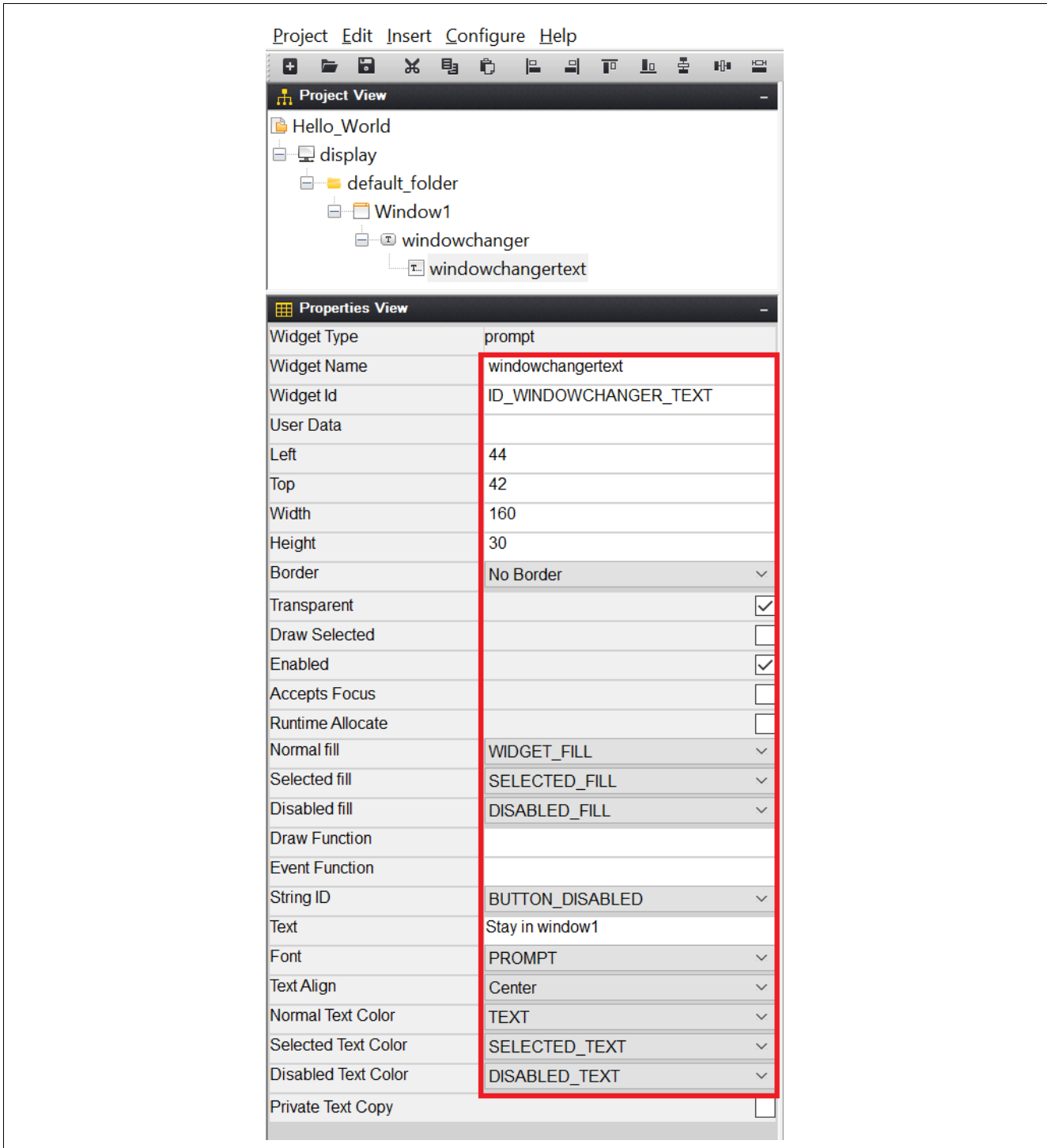


Figure 62. Properties View of prompt

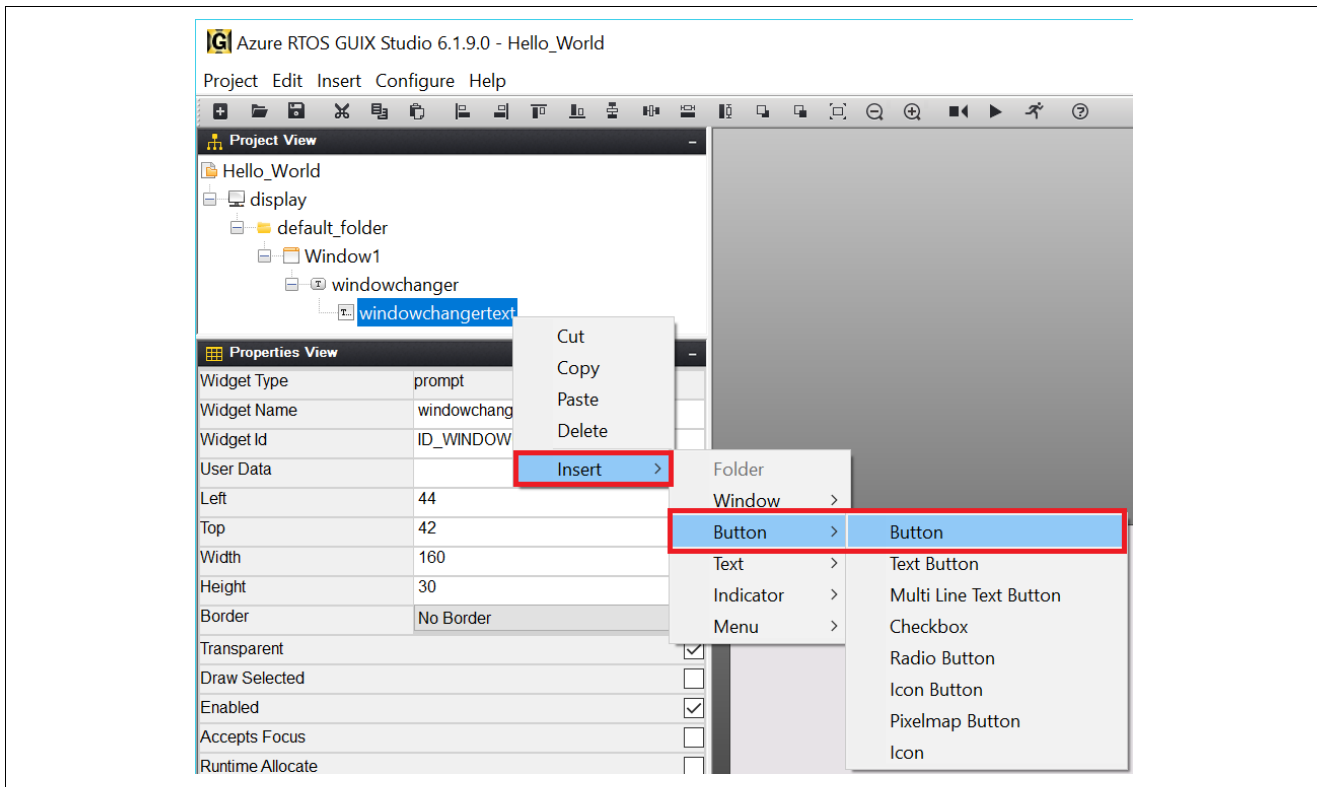


Figure 63. Insert Button

10. Insert new **Button**. Right-click on **windowchangertext** and follow Figure 63.

11. Set the **Properties View** of **button**.

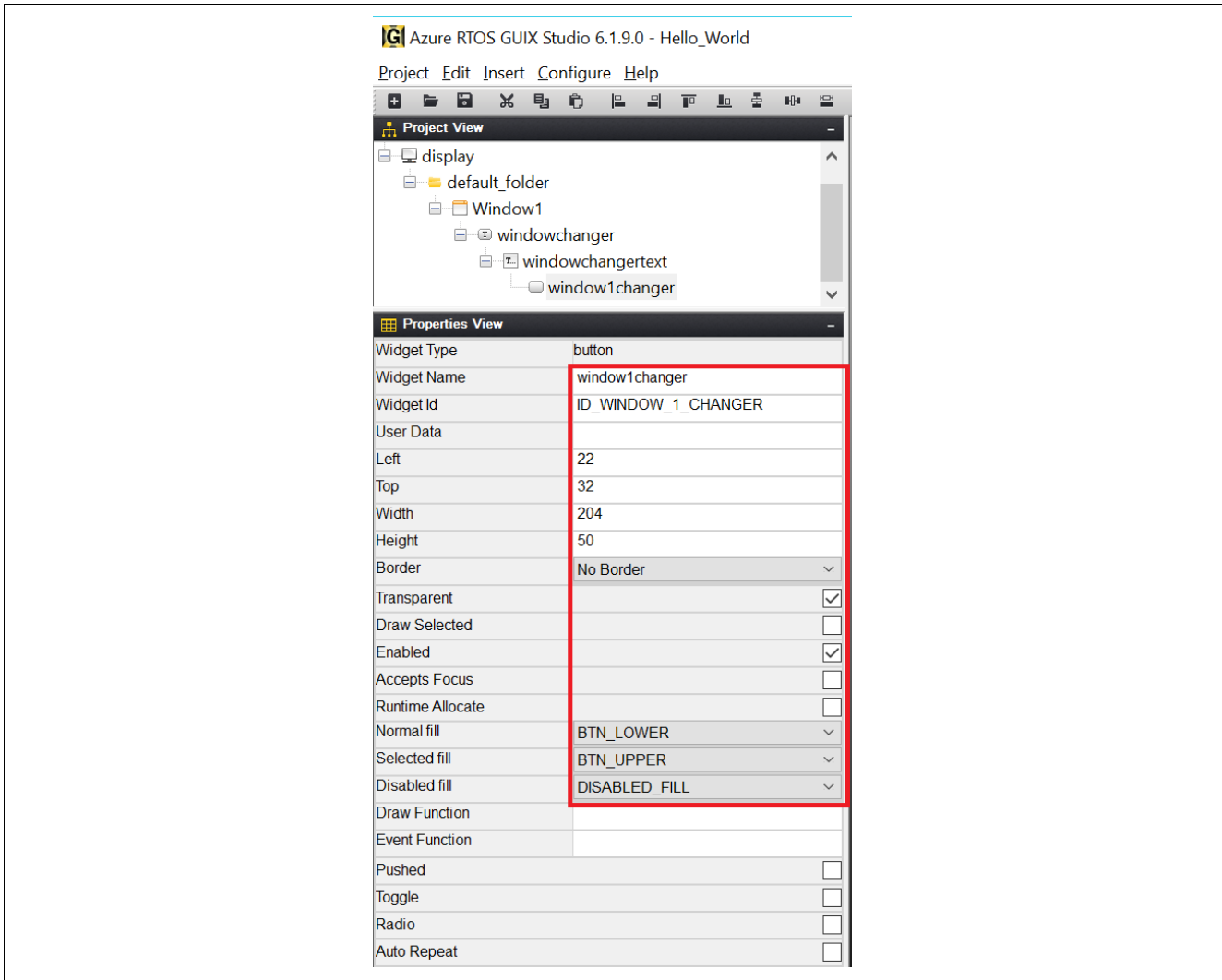


Figure 64. Properties View of button

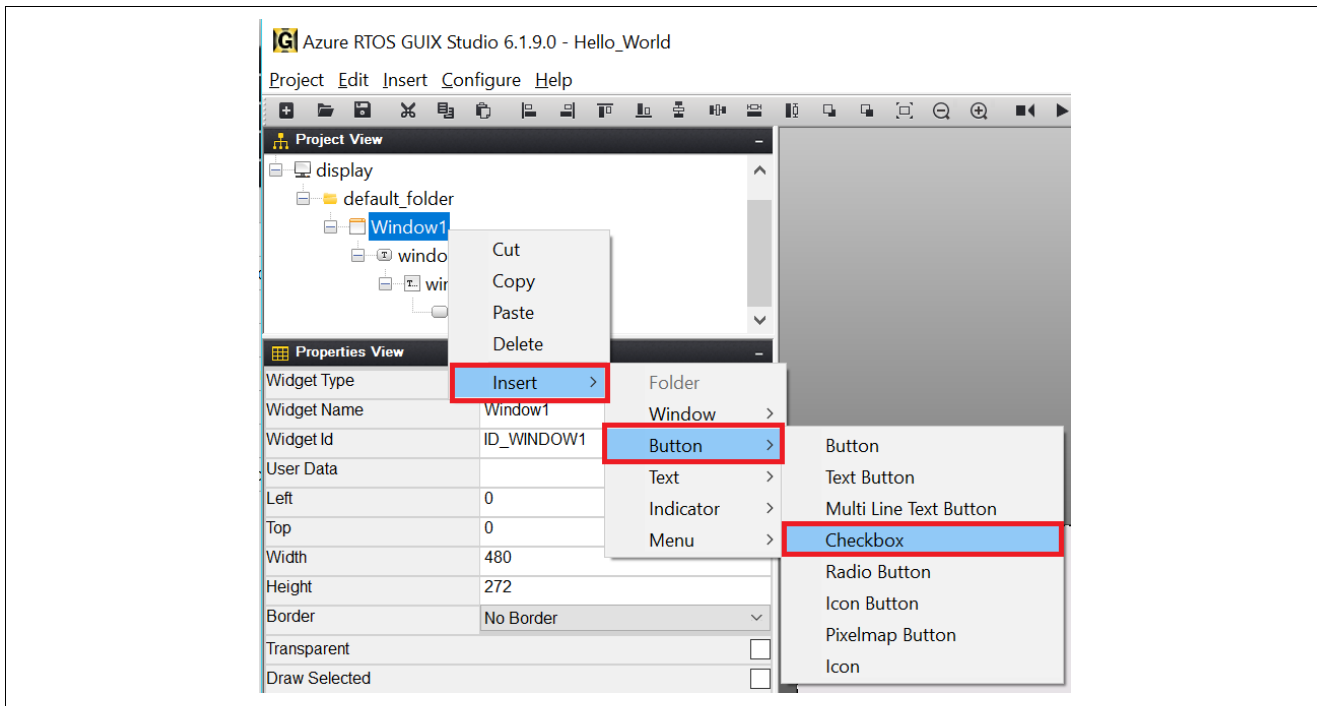


Figure 65. Insert Checkbox

12. Insert **Checkbox**. Right-click on **Window1** and follow Figure 65.

13. Set the **Properties View** of **button**.

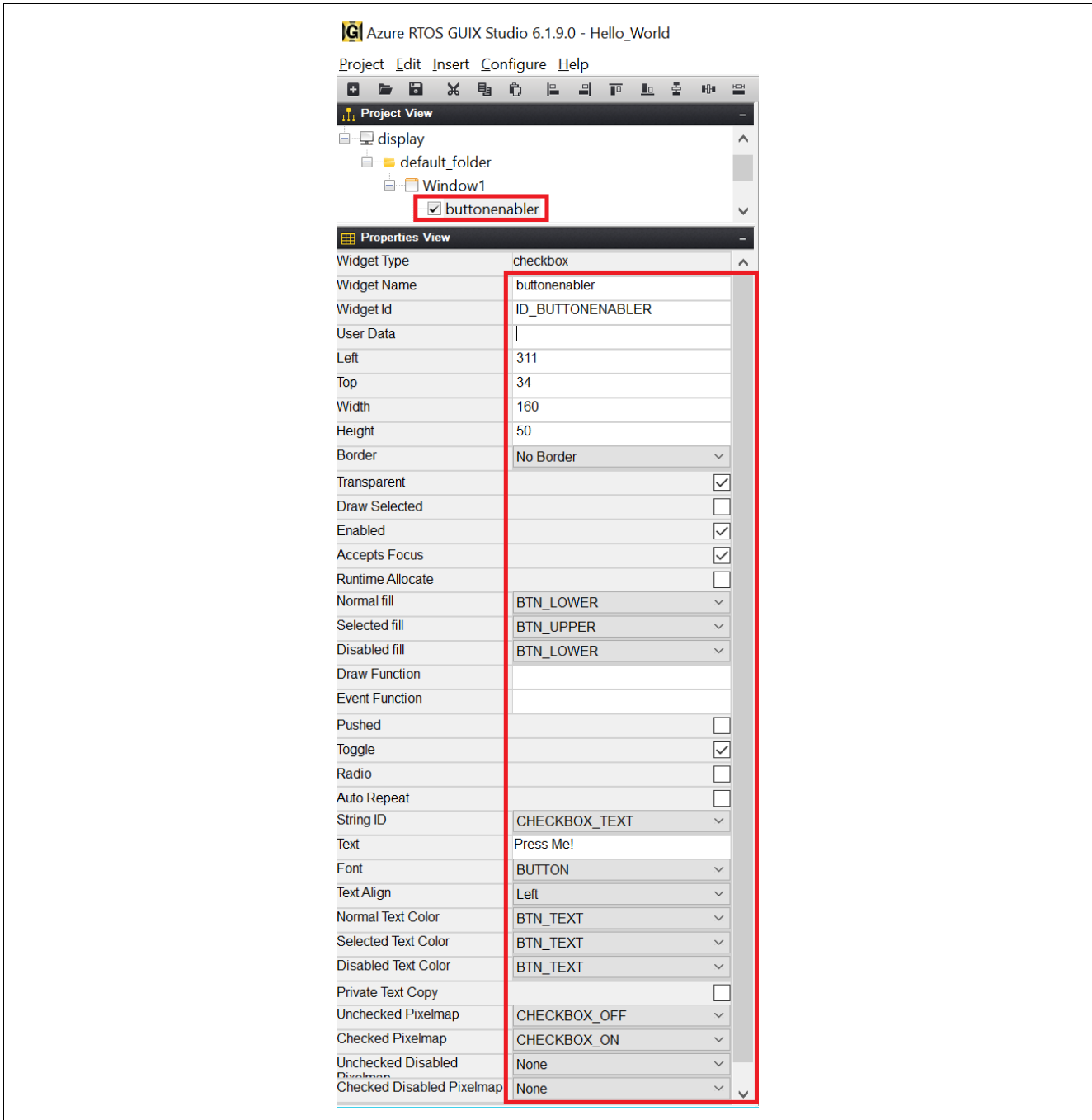


Figure 66. Properties View of button

Prompt and **Prompt1** will show up once you finish.

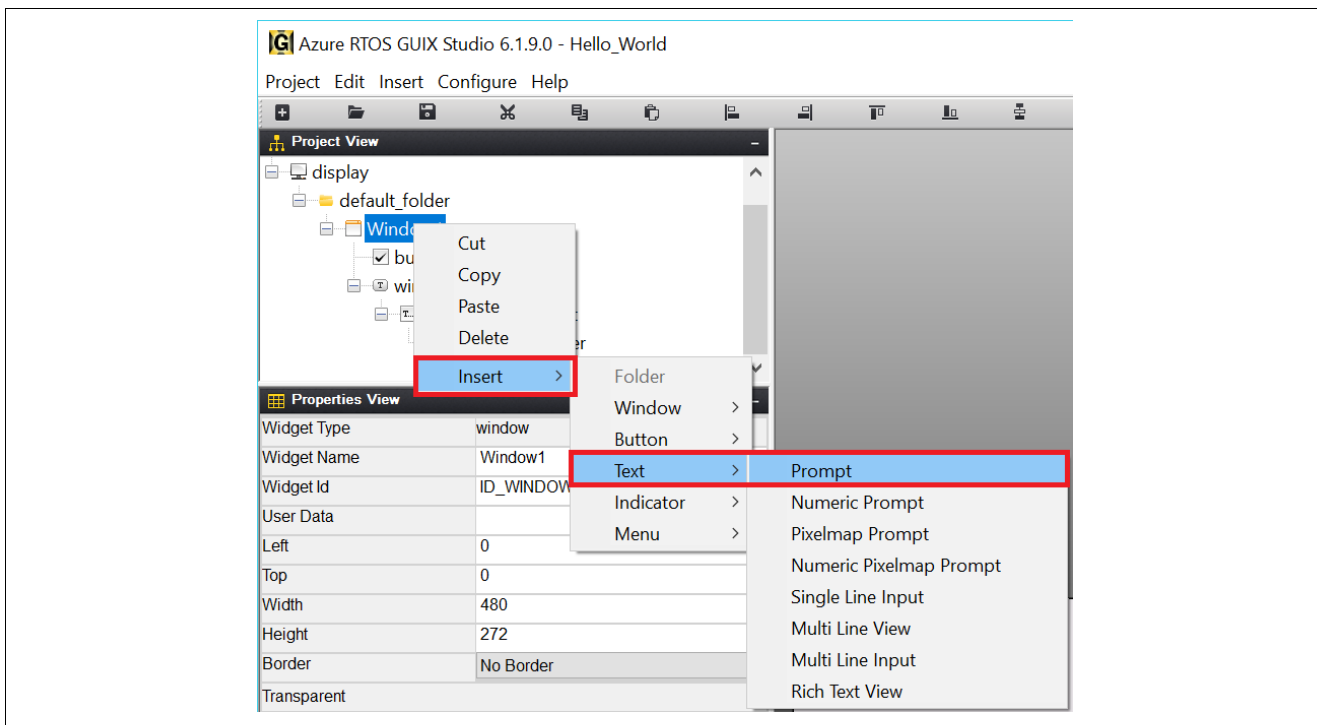


Figure 67. Insert Prompts

15. Set the **Properties View of Prompt**.

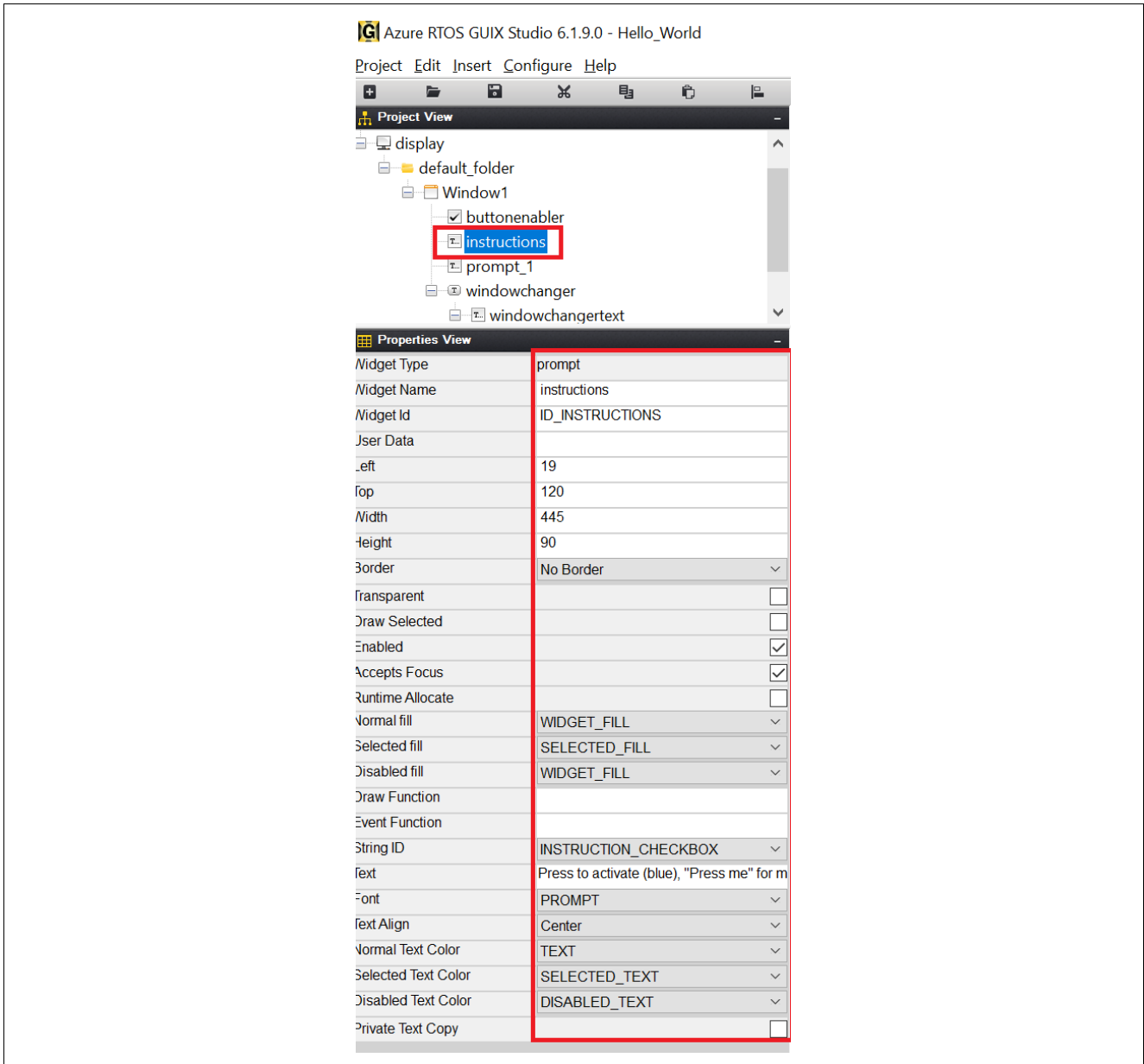


Figure 68. Properties View of Prompt

16. Set the **Properties View** of **Prompt1**.

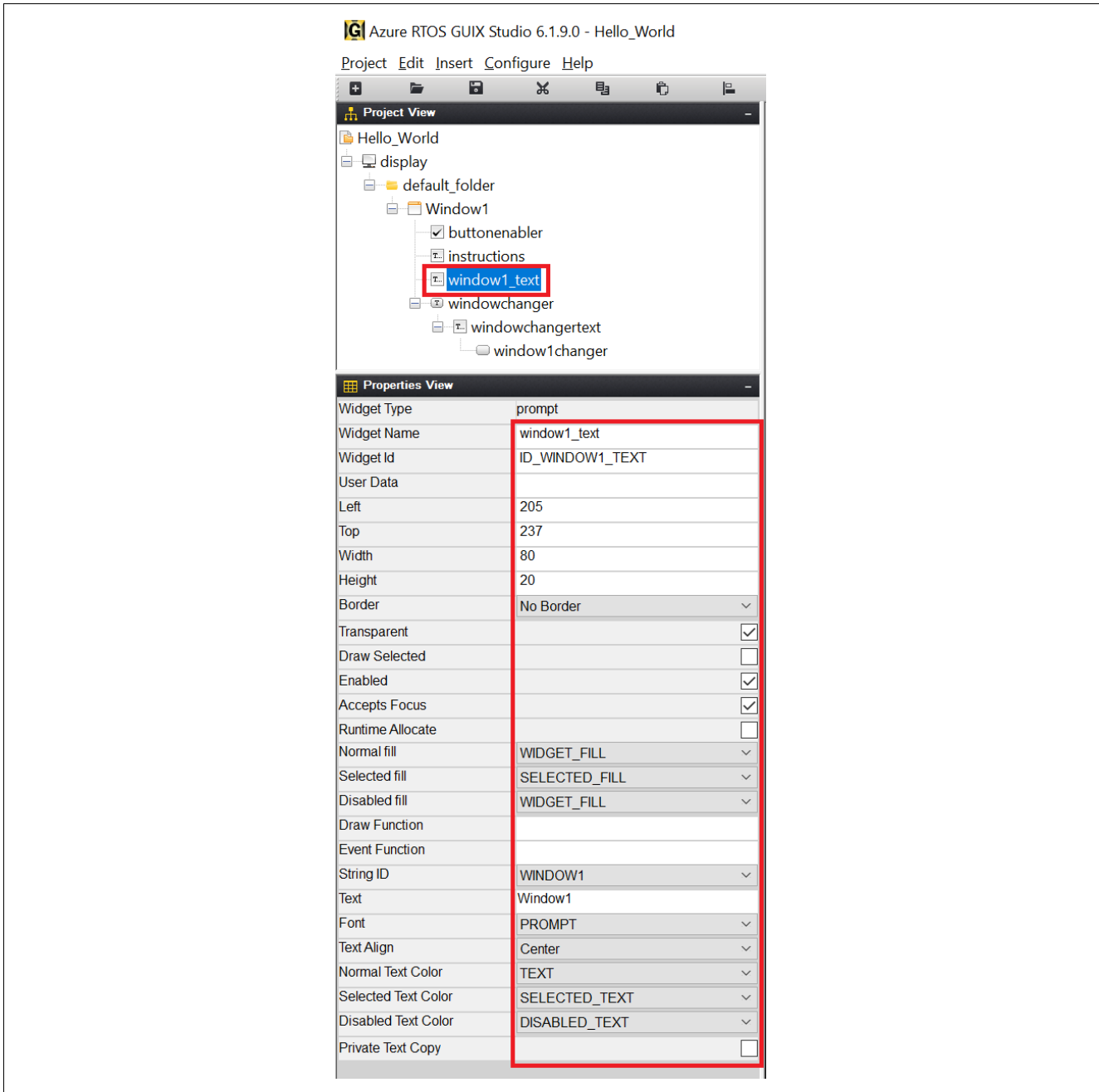


Figure 69. Properties View for Prompt1

17. After you finished creating **Window1**, it should be like the image below.

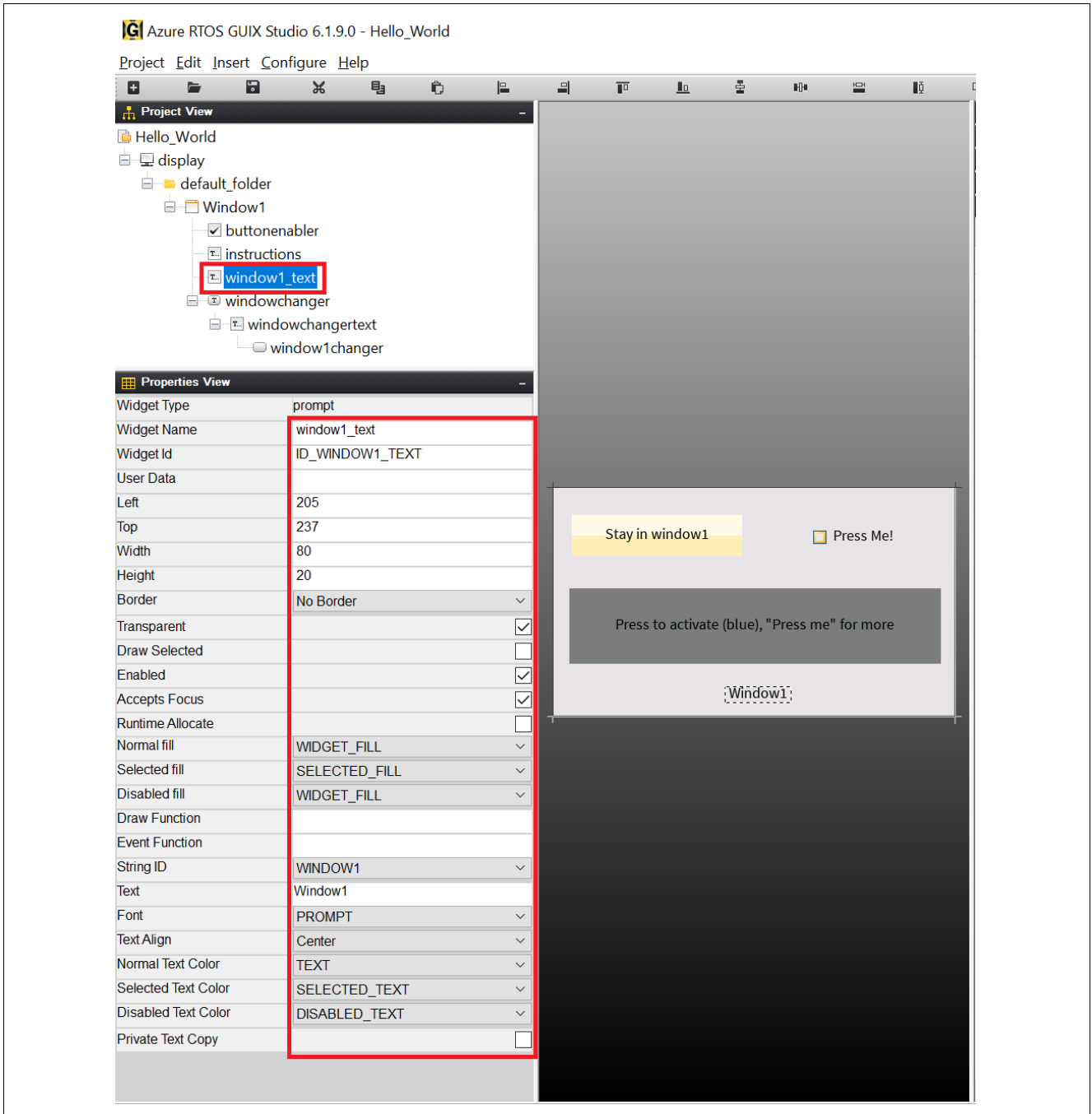


Figure 70. Window1 Created

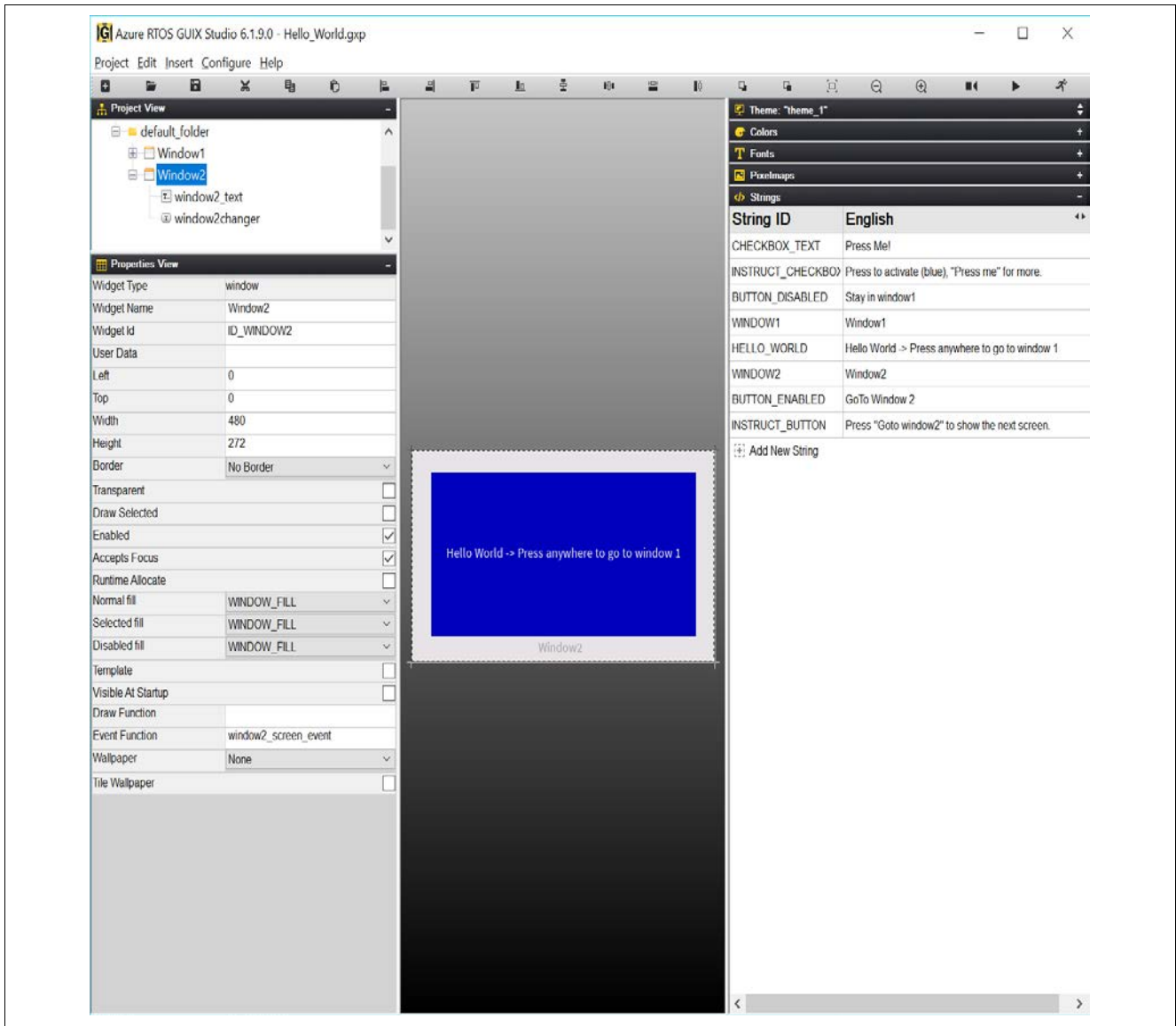


Figure 71. Window2

18. Follow all these concepts to create **Window2**. After you are done, then you should have **Window2** as shown in Figure 71.

- Click on drop-down list **Pixelmaps**, double-click on **CHECKBOX_OF** and a new window will pop up. Uncheck **Compress Output** then click **Save**. Do the same for **CHECKBOX_ON**.

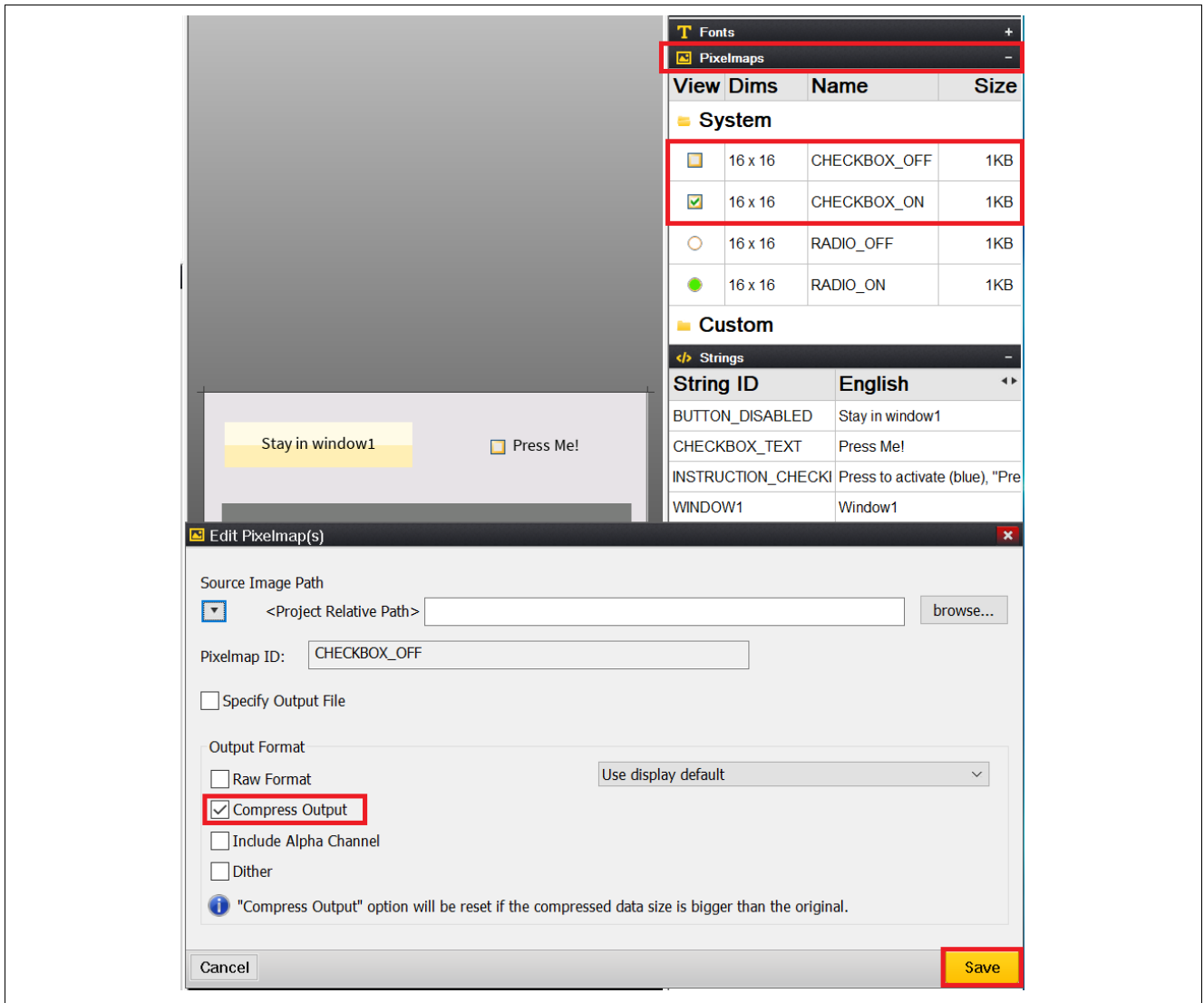


Figure 72. Set Up Pixelmap

20. Now you can click on the **Project** drop down list, **Save Project**, and **Generate All Output Files**. You completed the process of creating and exporting GUIX Hello World into the project.

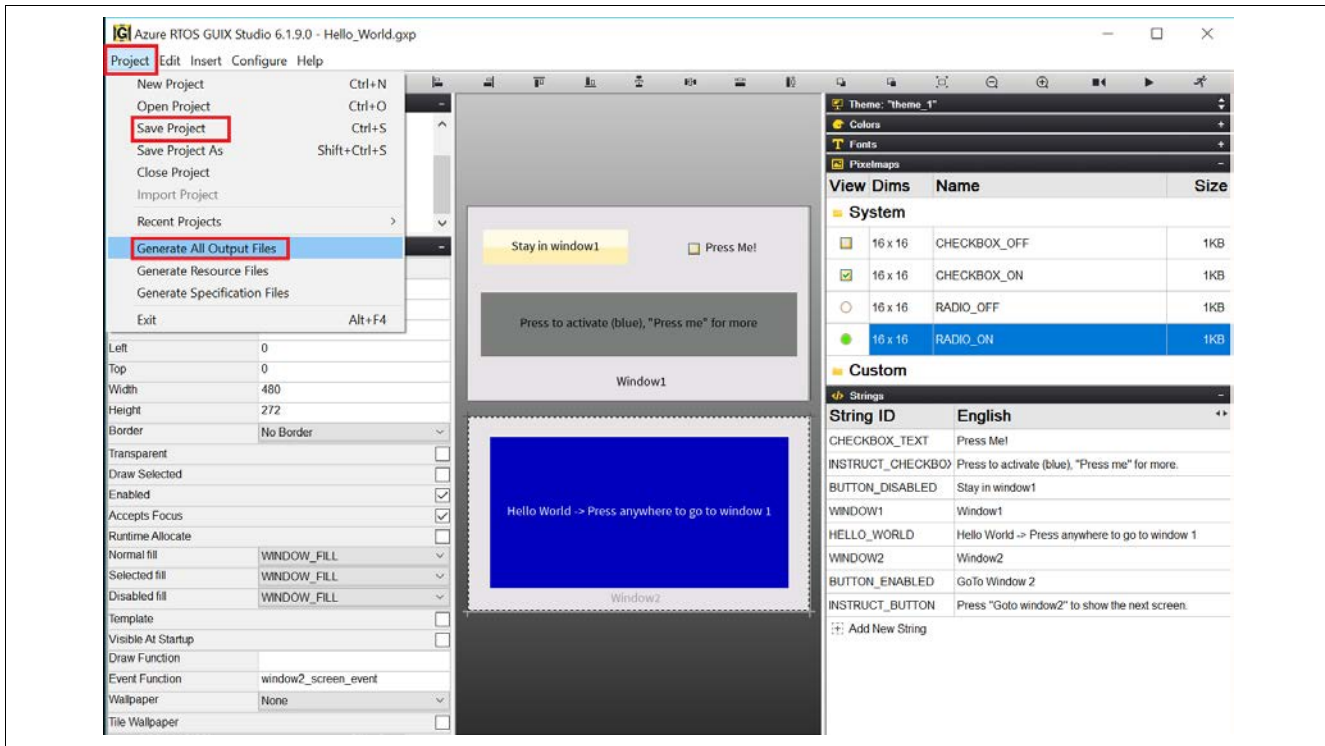



Figure 73. Save and Generate Project

21. Make sure the project is active and click  to build the project. It may take a long time to finish building an Azure RTOS/GUIX project on your PC. Project Hello_World_GUIX_EK_RA6M3G should build with no errors or warnings.

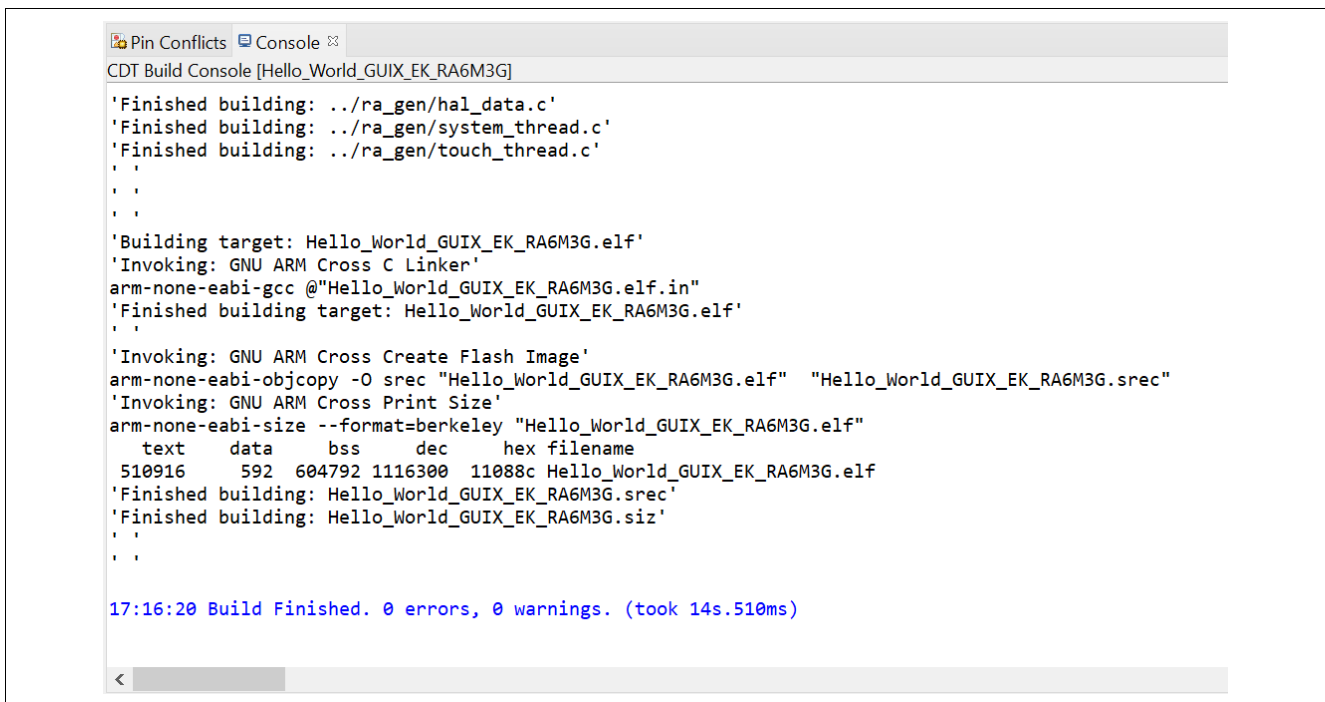


Figure 74. Project Builds Without Errors

22. Using the Micro USB cable, connect to J10 on EK-RA6M3G board and the other end to your PC. Download and run the Hello_World_GUIX_EK_RA6M3G project.
23. You will see the Window1 display on LCD panel.

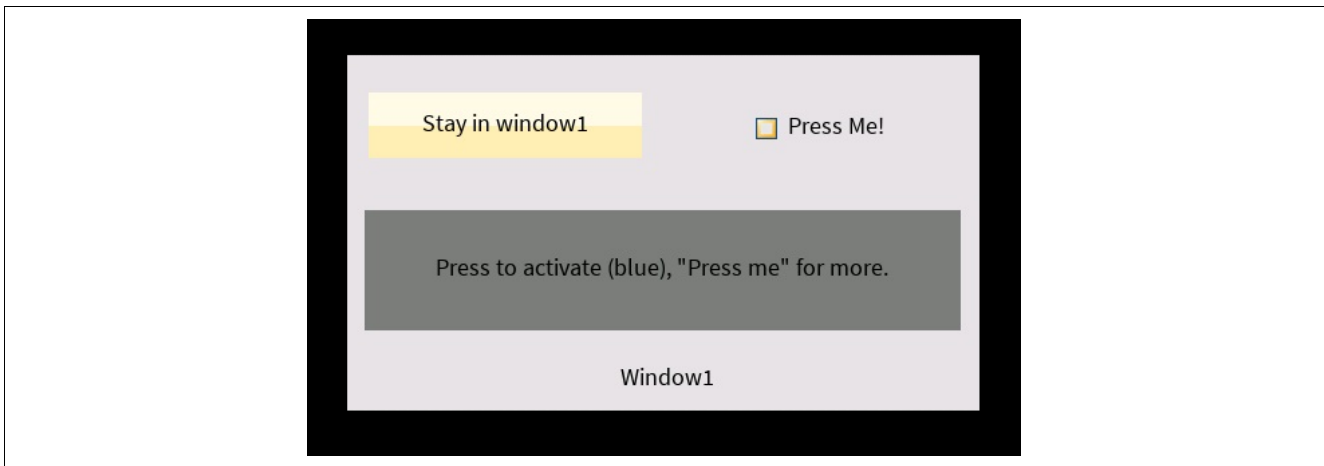


Figure 75. Window1 Display

6. Overview of Full Function Project

6.1 Overview

In this section, you will import and run the complete Hello_World_GUIX_EK_RA6M3G project. You can enable or disable check box function. The text on the button, which is “Stay in window1” or “Go to Window 2”, will be updated. Once you press the button, the screen will change from window1 to window2 . Follow the text message on the screen, you can change from window2 back to window1.

6.2 Procedural Steps

1. You can try the completed project **Hello_World_GUIX_EK_RA6M3G** for the full function application. Use the **Rename & Import Existing C/C++ Project into Workspace** feature of the **Import** menu to do so since you already had a project with the same in the workspace.

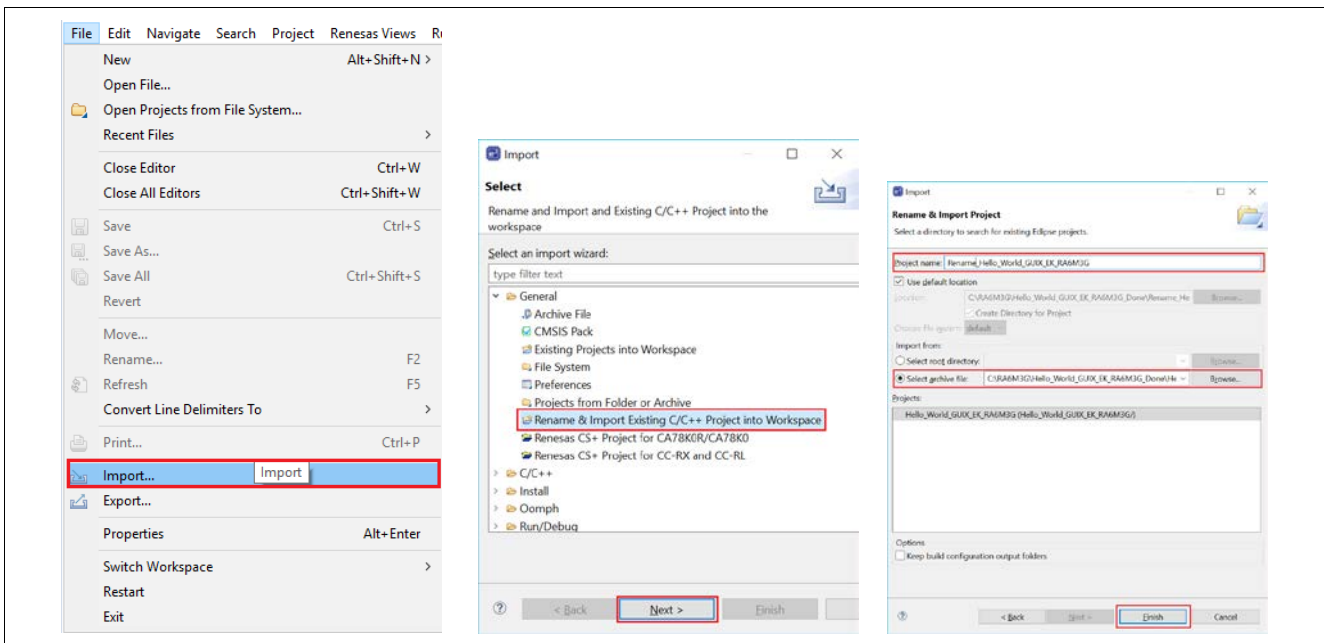


Figure 76. Import Existing Project

General Precautions in the Handling of Microprocessing Unit and Microcontroller Unit Products

The following usage notes are applicable to all Microprocessing unit and Microcontroller unit products from Renesas. For detailed usage notes on the products covered by this document, refer to the relevant sections of the document as well as any technical updates that have been issued for the products.

1. Precaution against Electrostatic Discharge (ESD)

A strong electrical field, when exposed to a CMOS device, can cause destruction of the gate oxide and ultimately degrade the device operation. Steps must be taken to stop the generation of static electricity as much as possible, and quickly dissipate it when it occurs. Environmental control must be adequate. When it is dry, a humidifier should be used. This is recommended to avoid using insulators that can easily build up static electricity.

Semiconductor devices must be stored and transported in an anti-static container, static shielding bag or conductive material. All test and measurement tools including work benches and floors must be grounded. The operator must also be grounded using a wrist strap. Semiconductor devices must not be touched with bare hands. Similar precautions must be taken for printed circuit boards with mounted semiconductor devices.

2. Processing at power-on

The state of the product is undefined at the time when power is supplied. The states of internal circuits in the LSI are indeterminate and the states of register settings and pins are undefined at the time when power is supplied. In a finished product where the reset signal is applied to the external reset pin, the states of pins are not guaranteed from the time when power is supplied until the reset process is completed. In a similar way, the states of pins in a product that is reset by an on-chip power-on reset function are not guaranteed from the time when power is supplied until the power reaches the level at which resetting is specified.

3. Input of signal during power-off state

Do not input signals or an I/O pull-up power supply while the device is powered off. The current injection that results from input of such a signal or I/O pull-up power supply may cause malfunction and the abnormal current that passes in the device at this time may cause degradation of internal elements. Follow the guideline for input signal during power-off state as described in your product documentation.

4. Handling of unused pins

Handle unused pins in accordance with the directions given under handling of unused pins in the manual. The input pins of CMOS products are generally in the high-impedance state. In operation with an unused pin in the open-circuit state, extra electromagnetic noise is induced in the vicinity of the LSI, an associated shoot-through current flows internally, and malfunctions occur due to the false recognition of the pin state as an input signal become possible.

5. Clock signals

After applying a reset, only release the reset line after the operating clock signal becomes stable. When switching the clock signal during program execution, wait until the target clock signal is stabilized. When the clock signal is generated with an external resonator or from an external oscillator during a reset, ensure that the reset line is only released after full stabilization of the clock signal. Additionally, when switching to a clock signal produced with an external resonator or by an external oscillator while program execution is in progress, wait until the target clock signal is stable.

6. Voltage application waveform at input pin

Waveform distortion due to input noise or a reflected wave may cause malfunction. If the input of the CMOS device stays in the area between V_{IL} (Max.) and V_{IH} (Min.) due to noise, for example, the device may malfunction. Take care to prevent chattering noise from entering the device when the input level is fixed, and also in the transition period when the input level passes through the area between V_{IL} (Max.) and V_{IH} (Min.).

7. Prohibition of access to reserved addresses

Access to reserved addresses is prohibited. The reserved addresses are provided for possible future expansion of functions. Do not access these addresses as the correct operation of the LSI is not guaranteed.

8. Differences between products

Before changing from one product to another, for example to a product with a different part number, confirm that the change will not lead to problems. The characteristics of a microprocessing unit or microcontroller unit products in the same group but having a different part number might differ in terms of internal memory capacity, layout pattern, and other factors, which can affect the ranges of electrical characteristics, such as characteristic values, operating margins, immunity to noise, and amount of radiated noise. When changing to a product with a different part number, implement a system-evaluation test for the given product.

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
